Review of Partial Phase III Construction Documents (Structural and Building Envelope), Project 597-D-10-5, Remodel/Renovate for Classrooms/Labs (College of Education), Olympia Building, Tarpon Springs Campus

On October 20, 2009, the Board of Trustees approved Phase I Schematic Design Documents and an early bid package to allow for the utility relocations, demolition and structural systems. The current Phase III Construction Documents include the final plans for the foundations, structural steel, roofing systems and building envelope.

This project will consist of approximately 39,232 square feet of two-story space at the center section of the Olympia Building Warehouse space (connecting to the existing bookstore and café) and leave the north side of the Olympia Building as approximately 40,000 SF Warehouse space. This will require installing new structural systems and exterior fenestration at the center of the Olympia Building and building out the interior of this space as a consolidated location for the College of Education at the Tarpon Springs Campus. This project includes a new main entry to the Olympia Building (College of Education, Bookstore and Café) from the parking at the east side of the Olympia Building. Additionally, this project will provide a new entry on the west side of the Olympia Building, providing a more direct connection of this new space to the balance of the Campus.

The total Preliminary Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) for this project remains at \$9,176,884 or \$233.91 per square foot with a total project budget of \$12,466,797 as approved on October 20, 2009. The date for substantial completion has been set for December 2, 2010. A final GMP will be brought to the Board for review and approval once the Phase III Construction Documents are completed for the entire project (May 2010).

These Phase III Construction Documents (Structural and Building Envelope) are presented today for your review and approval. The construction documents have been reviewed by Conferlete Carney, Provost, Tarpon Springs Campus; Sally Naylor, Dean, College of Education; Anne Cooper, Senior Vice President, Academic and Student Affairs; and Kay Burniston, Vice President Baccalaureate Programs and University Partnerships.

Authorization is requested for the following:

- To approve Phase III Construction Documents (Structural and Building Envelope);
- To approve proceeding with the construction of the work detailed in the Phase III Construction Documents (Structural and Building Envelope).

Amendment to Lease Agreement between St. Petersburg College and National University of Health Sciences (NUHS) for a Lease of Space at the Health Education Center

The Board previously approved a lease agreement between St. Petersburg College and the National University of Health Sciences (NUHS) for a portion of the first floor of the Bankers Insurance Group Orthotics and Prosthetics Building (O&P Building) located at the Health Education Center on April 21, 2009.

Approval is sought to extend this lease agreement for an additional one (1) year term on the same terms and conditions of the original agreement except for the operating fee, which is being increased to match the current State-mandated Standard for Operation of Community College rates. The operating fee will be increased to \$7.14 per square foot (previously \$7.05) for Exclusive Use space and \$3.57 (previously \$3.52) per square foot for Concurrent Use space. The details of the Total Annual Lease Revenue are noted below:

WHEREAS, THE College and NUHS did enter into that certain Lease Agreement dated April 28th, 2009, whereby the College leased to NUHS a portion of the College's property located at 7200 66th St. N, Pinellas Park, FL, 33781, in the O & P Building (the "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, unless otherwise specifically stated in this First Amendment to the contrary, the terms and definitions used herein shall have the same meaning as set forth in the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Term is set to expire on May 10th, 2010; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to extend the Agreement for an additional one (1) year term on such terms and conditions as are set forth in the Agreement, except as specifically modified herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and one dollar and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties further agree as follows:

- 1. The recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. The Term of the Agreement is hereby extended for an additional one (1) year term commencing on May 11th, 2010 and continuing through and until May 10th, 2011.
- 3. The Operating Fee for the Leased Premises is hereby increased to \$8,269.12. The Operating Fee will be paid in four quarterly installments of \$2,067.28 on May 11th, August 11th, November 11th, and February 11th during the Term. The Operating Fee increase is attributable to an increase in the fee for the

Exclusive Use Space to \$7.14 per square foot and an increase in the fee for the Concurrent Use Space to \$3.57 per square foot.

All other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect except as specifically modified herein. If any of the provisions of this First Amendment conflict with any terms of the Agreement, the provisions of the First Amendment shall govern and control.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE

Agreement between St. Petersburg College and BayCare Health System to Lease Space at the District Office

St. Petersburg College (College) and BayCare Health System (BayCare) have agreed, under the following terms and conditions, to partner together at the District Office, EpiCenter, to provide a space to conduct training and educational seminars for their employees, staff and contractors related to the provision of health care services. The agreement is subject to the approval of each partners' respective Board, if any. The salient terms and conditions are set forth below:

- The College will lease to BayCare a portion of the first floor of the District Office consisting of approximately 4,686 square feet of Exclusive Use space and 2,301 square feet of Concurrent Use space. These spaces will be used by BayCare as classrooms and offices.
- The lease period runs from January 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010. The Agreement may be extended for consecutive one (1) year terms upon mutual agreement of the parties in writing before the end of any Term. BayCare will be retroactively charged for use of the space beginning January 1, 2010.
- BayCare shall pay to the College Base Rent for the Leased Premises in the amount of \$10.61 per square foot for Exclusive Use space and \$5.31 for Concurrent Use space; Therefore, the annual rent payments for the first year will be \$61,936.77 (4,686 square feet x \$10.61 + 2,301 square feet x \$5.31). Additionally, BayCare shall pay to the College its pro-rata share of any utility rate assessment, stormwater fee or other surcharge that may be assessed from time to time to the College for the District Office. The College reserves the right to increase Base Rent for any renewal term.
- As part of the Base Rent, the College shall provide utilities, including electrical, heating, ventilation and air conditioning, water, garbage and sewer, custodial services, and maintenance services, including maintenance of HVAC systems, roof, exterior walls and structural systems.

The lease agreement is being provided to the Board as required by Florida Statutes, Chapter 1013.15 Lease, rental, and lease-purchase of educational facilities and sites, Section (1):

Prior to entering into or executing any such lease, a board shall consider approval of the lease or lease-purchase agreement at a public meeting, at which a copy of the proposed agreement in its final form shall be available for inspection and review by the public, after due notice as required by law.

Authorization is sought to enter into a Lease Agreement with BayCare Health System to lease a space from the College at the District Office.

LEASE AGREEMENT ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE AND BAYCARE HEALTH SYSTEM, INC.

("BayCare").	

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, BayCare is a not for profit entity committed to improving the health of all who they serve through community-owned health care services that set the standard for high quality compassionate care; and

WHEREAS, BayCare is in need of facilities to conduct training and educational seminars for their employees, staff and contractors related to the provision of health care services set forth in BayCare's mission statement; and

WHEREAS, the College desires to lease to BayCare, and BayCare desires to lease from the College, on such terms and conditions as set forth below, a portion of the College's premises located at the St. Petersburg College District Office, located at 6021 142nd Ave., Clearwater, Florida, 32760 ("District Office"), as is more fully described in Paragraph 2 below ("Leased Premises"); and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and one dollar and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, and the promises and covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. RECITALS. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. LEASED PREMISES. The College hereby leases to BayCare and BayCare does hereby lease from the College a portion of the first floor of the District Office, as is more fully set forth on that site plan attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit "A" ("Site Plan"). BayCare shall have exclusive use of Rooms 164a, 164b, 164c, 169, 170, 171, 173, 176 and 177 consisting of approximately 4,686 square feet (All references to Room Numbers in this Lease Agreement are as set forth and designated in the Site Plan). The College, Baycare and other occupants of the District Office and the employees and invitees of the aforementioned parties shall have concurrent access at all times to the restroom space, hallways, and corridors during the Term or any renewal thereof. The concurrent use space consists of approximately 2,301 square feet.
- 3. TERM. The initial term of this Lease shall be for a period of one (1) year commencing on January 1, 2010 and continuing through and until December 31, 2010 ("Term"); thereafter, this Lease Agreement may be renewed for subsequent one

- (1) year terms upon mutual agreement in writing by the parties hereto before the end of the Term or any renewal term.
- 4. BASE RENT. BayCare shall pay to the College base rent for the Leased Premises in the amount of Sixty One Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Six and 77/100 Dollars (\$61,936.77) per year ("Base Rent"). Baycare shall pay the first installment of Base Rent in the amount of \$20,645.57 to the College by April 1st, 2010; thereafter, Baycare shall pay the remainder of the Base Rent in equal monthly installments of \$5,161.40 which shall be due on the first of each month for the remaining months left in the Term beginning May 1st, 2010. Additionally, BayCare shall pay to the College its pro-rata share of any utility rate assessment or surcharge that may be assessed from time to time to the College for the District Office. The College shall provide BayCare with monthly invoices outlining the sums due the College hereunder. Failure by the College to provide an invoice or to accurately reflect any amount due the College pursuant to this Lease Agreement in the invoice shall not act as a waiver or relieve BayCare of its obligations to the College with respect to payment to the College of such sums.
- MAINTENANCE AND SECURITY: The College shall provide BayCare for the Leased Premises: (i) utilities, including electrical, heating, ventilation and air conditioning, water, garbage and sewer; (ii) custodial services; (iii) maintenance services, including maintenance and repair of HVAC systems, roof, exterior walls and structural systems; and (iv) security, during the normal hours of operation of the College as defined in paragraph 7, below. In the event that BayCare requires any maintenance or repair services to the Leased Premises, the Director of BayCare's Education Services or his/her designee shall submit a Work Order to the College outlining the work to be performed through procedures set forth by the College and given to BayCare prior to the beginning of the Term.
- 6. USE. The Leased Premises shall be used and occupied by BayCare for educational, instructional and administrative office purposes, consistent with BayCare's normal business operations, and for no other purposes. BayCare shall not compete with the College with respect to offering courses or seminars that are similar to College programs. All use of the Leased Premises shall be in compliance with all laws. For purposes of this Agreement, "Laws" means all applicable present and future (i) federal, state, and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules regulations, and codes and the federal and state constitutions; (ii) decrees, orders, applicable equitable remedies and decisions by courts in cases where such decisions are binding precedent in the State of Florida; (iii) decisions of federal courts applying the Laws of the State of Florida; and (iv) rules, regulations and orders of quasi official entities or bodies (e.g., boards and bureaus), as the same may be amended or supplemented from time to time.
- 7. HOURS OF USE. The District Office shall be open 7:00am to 10:00pm, Monday-Thursday, and 7:00am 6:00pm Friday and 7:30am- 6:00pm on Saturday, unless on a case by case basis prior arrangements are made through the Director of Facilities, Planning and Institutional Services for hours of use other than as set forth herein. BayCare and the College shall coordinate with one another with respect to BayCare's access to the Leased Premises and services provided during official College holidays. BayCare shall have access to the Leased Premises at times other than as set forth above through electronic security cards. BayCare shall provide the College with a list

of those persons in need of electronic security cards before the beginning of the Term.

- 8. PARKING. BayCare, its employees, agents, and invitees may utilize those parking spaces located at the District Office.
- 9. ALTERATIONS TO THE PREMISES. BayCare will not, without the College's prior written consent, make any material changes or alterations, additions or improvements in or about the Leased Premises. Such consent may be given in writing by the College's Vice President of Facilities, Planning and Institutional Services, and shall be subject to the College's building and permitting department in compliance with the Florida Building Code (FBC), Florida Fire Prevention Code (FFPC), and the American's with Disability Act (ADA).
- 10. NO FURTHER ENCUMBRANCES. BayCare shall not have any right to encumber or mortgage the Leased Premises or otherwise place a lien or judgment upon its leasehold interest or the fee, and shall save the College harmless from any liens, claims judgments and demands, of whatsoever nature, made by any third party, including, but not limited to, any subcontractors, material men and vendors in connection with any work performed upon the Leased Premises by or on behalf of BayCare.
- 11. TENANT'S DEFAULT. "Default" shall be the occurrence of any one or more of the following events which shall permit the College, subject to the cure periods herein stated, to immediately terminate this Lease and take possession of the Leased Premises.
 - a. BayCare's failure to pay any sums payable to the College which shall be and remain unpaid for more than thirty (30) days after the same are due and payable.
 - b. BayCare's abandonment or vacation of the Leased Premises.
 - c. BayCare's voluntary or involuntary transfer of its leasehold interest hereunder to any other person or other entity, without the prior written approval of the College.
 - d. BayCare's material breach of the performance of any of the other covenants, agreements, stipulations or conditions herein and such breach shall not be cured within a period of thirty (30) days after written notice by the College to BayCare of such breach.
 - e. The filing of any bankruptcy proceedings on behalf of or against BayCare.
 - f. Use of the Leased Premises by BayCare other than as specified in Paragraph 6 or in non-compliance therewith.
 - g. BayCare's encumbrance of the Leased Premises or the fee, or its allowing the Leased Premises or fee to be encumbered, or any other breach of the provisions in paragraph 10, herein.
- 12. LANDLORD'S DEFAULT. A material breach by the College in its performance of the covenants, agreements, stipulations or conditions herein shall constitute a default under this Lease, unless the College cures such breach within thirty (30) days after written notice by BayCare to the College of such breach.
- 13. DISPUTE RESOLUTION. To the extent BayCare and the College cannot, after good faith attempts, resolve any controversy or dispute that may have arisen under this

Lease Agreement, either party, to the extent its interests are adversely impacted, may refer the matter to non-binding mediation in Pinellas County, Florida. The dispute will be mediated by a mediator chosen jointly by the College and Bay Care within thirty (30) days after notice by one of the parties demanding non-binding mediation. Neither party may unreasonably withhold consent to the selection of a mediator. The College and BayCare will share the cost of mediation equally.

Any dispute that cannot be resolved between the parties through negotiation or mediation within sixty (60) days after the date of the initial demand for non-binding mediation may then be submitted by either party to a court of competent jurisdiction in Pinellas County, Florida. The use of mediation will not be considered under the doctrine of laches, waiver or estoppel to affect adversely the rights of either party. Either party may resort to submitting the dispute to a court of competent jurisdiction as set forth herein prior to the expiration of the 60 day period set forth above, if: (i) good faith efforts to attempt resolution of the dispute under those procedures have been unsuccessful; or (b) interim relief from the court is necessary to prevent serious and irreparable injury to such party or any of its affiliates, agents, employees, customers, suppliers or contractors.

- ASSIGNMENT. BayCare shall not have the right to assign, sublease or otherwise dispose of this Lease or any part thereof, or of its right, title or interest therein or its power to execute this Lease or any amendment or modification thereto, to any person or entity, without the prior written consent of the College, which consent may be withheld in the sole discretion of the College.
- 15. INSURANCE. BayCare shall maintain liability insurance for personal injury and/or bodily injury including death, of not less than \$1,000,000 per person, \$2,000,000 per occurrence. BayCare shall be required to maintain hazard insurance on its personal property located on or about the Leased Premises. The College shall be named as additional insured on all liability policies and a certificate of insurance shall be provided to the College prior to occupancy by BayCare of the Leased Premises.
- TAXES. BayCare shall be responsible for and shall pay before delinquency all municipal, county, state and federal taxes, if any, assessed during the Term against personal property of any kind owned by or placed in, upon or about the Leased Premises by BayCare. BayCare shall pay all applicable fees and taxes, if any, levied on the Leased Premises or the contents thereof including but not limited to sales taxes, property taxes and stormwater fees, and provide notice to the College of the payment of the same.
- 17. LATE CHARGE. If any payment due to the College is not paid within thirty (30) days after its due date, BayCare shall pay a late charge equal to five percent (5%) of the late amount to compensate the College for the additional administrative expense and loss occasioned thereby. In addition, the College may assess a charge at the maximum rate allowable by law for any check from BayCare returned to the College for insufficient funds. The late charge provided herein may be waived by the College upon a showing of good cause by BayCare for such late payment.
- 18. FUNDING FOR COLLEGE. The College represents that it is a political subdivision existing under the laws of the State of Florida and is funded and relies upon the State for its programs and services. Should legislative appropriations be insufficient, to

continue the operation of the District Office, including the Leased Premises, the College may terminate this Lease with one (1) year notice to BayCare, without further liability to BayCare or any third party.

- 19. THIRD PARTY CLAUSE. This Lease Agreement is for the sole benefit of BayCare and the College and not for any third party. Except as expressly provided in this Lease Agreement, there are no third-party beneficiaries of this Lease Agreement. This Lease Agreement does not create or confer any legal claim or cause of action in favor or any party not a signatory to this Lease Agreement and the obligations and legal duties imposed on any party by this Lease Agreement are owed exclusively to the other party or parties and are not owed to any party not a signatory to this Lease Agreement.
- 20. DISCRIMINATION. Neither the College nor BayCare will discriminate in its employment practices, provision of services to the College's students and the general public or otherwise on the basis of race, color, religion, age, sex, marital status or national origin nor will either discriminate against any qualified person with a disability. The parties agree that sexual harassment constitutes discrimination on the basis of sex.
- 21. ENVIRONMENTAL/HAZARDOUS WASTE. BayCare shall not use, generate, manufacture, produce, store, release, discharge or dispose of, on, under or about the Leased Premises, or transport to or from the Leased Premises, any Hazardous Substances (as defined herein) or allow any other person or entity to do so. BayCare shall keep and maintain the Leased Premises in compliance with, and shall not cause or permit the Leased Premises to be in violation of, any applicable environmental laws. BayCare agrees to protect indemnify and hold harmless the College, its directors, officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns from and against any and all loss, damage, cost, expense or liability (including attorney's fees and costs) directly or indirectly arising out of or attributable to the use, generation, manufacture, production, storage, release, threatened release, discharge, disposal, transport or presence of a Hazardous Substance on, under, about, to or from the Leased Premises, including without limitation all foreseeable consequential damages and the costs of any necessary repair, cleanup or detoxification of the Leased Premises, in any way arising from the acts of BayCare. The College shall have the right to inspect the Leased Premises and audit BayCare's operations thereon at any reasonable time to ascertain BayCare's compliance with the provisions of this Lease Agreement, and BayCare shall provide periodic certifications to the College, upon request, that the College shall have the right but not the obligation, to enter upon the Leased Premises and perform any obligation of BayCare hereunder of which BayCare is in default, including without limitation any remediation necessary due to environmental impact of BayCare's operations on the Leased Premises, without waiving or reducing BayCare's liability for their default hereunder. All terms and provisions of this paragraph shall survive expiration or termination of the Lease for any reason whatsoever. "Hazardous Substance" means any substance, whether solid, liquid or gaseous which is listed, defined or regulated as a "hazardous substance," "hazardous waste" or "solid waste," or pesticide, or otherwise classified as hazardous or toxic, in or pursuant to any environmental requirement; or which is or contains asbestos, radon, any polychlorinated biphenyl, urea formaldehyde foam insulation, explosive or radioactive material, or motor fuel or other petroleum hydrocarbons; or which causes or poses a threat to cause a contamination or nuisance on the Leased Premises

or any adjacent property or a hazard to the environment or to the health or safety of persons on the Leased Premises.

- 22. RADON GAS DISCLOSURE: Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that, when it has accumulated in a building in sufficient quantities, may present health risks to persons who are exposed to it over time. Levels of Radon that exceed federal and state guidelines have been found in buildings in Florida. Additional information regarding Radon and Radon testing may be obtained from your county public health unit.
- 23. INSPECTION AND ACCESS TO PREMISES. The College shall have the right to enter the premises at all times upon reasonable notice to BayCare (except in the case of an emergency, in which case no prior notice need be given), to examine the Leased Premises, to survey the Leased Premises and make such repairs, alterations, improvements, or additions as the College may deem necessary or desirable at the College's expense, except for expenses incurred for such examination, surveying, repairs, alterations improvements or additions due to the actions of BayCare, its officers, directors, agents, employees, contractors, invitees or licensees for which BayCare shall reimburse the College for expenses incurred in such an event.
- 24. INDEMNITY. BayCare covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Board of Trustees of St. Petersburg College and its students, faculty, employees, staff and invitees from and against any and all loss, claims, liabilities, fines, injury and/or damages to persons or property (including personal and real property of the College), penalties, suits, attorney's fees, including but not limited to fees incurred for service in trial and appellate courts, and expenses by reason of or arising out of any damage or injury to personal property, real property, or to persons (including death) caused by or resulting from BayCare's operation, use or occupancy of the Leased Premises.
- 25. CONDEMNATION. In the event of condemnation, this Lease Agreement shall terminate as of the date the condemning authority takes title or possession, whichever first occurs. Any award or payment made in connection with a condemnation shall be the property of the College, whether such award shall be made in settlement of contemplated condemnation proceedings or as compensation for diminution in value of the leasehold or for the taking of the fee, or as severance or other damages; provided, however, BayCare shall be entitled to any separate award made to BayCare which does not diminish the College's award, such as for loss of or damage to BayCare's trade fixtures and removable personal property and any business damages or moving expenses. In the event that this Lease is not terminated by reason of such condemnation, the College shall, to the extent of severance damages received by College in connection with such condemnation, repair any damage to the Leased Premises (except for trade fixtures and personal property of BayCare) caused by such condemnation, except to the extent that BayCare has been reimbursed therefore by the condemning authority.

26. CASUALTY.

(a) If the Leased Premises or any portion thereof is destroyed or substantially damaged by fire or other casualty, the College shall proceed with reasonable

diligence to repair and restore the Leased Premises (exclusive of BayCare's trade fixtures, signs, contents and personal property) to substantially the same condition as the Leased Premises was in immediately before the happening of the casualty. However, the College shall not be required to restore any portion of the District Office which is not leased to BayCare.

- (b) Anything contained in paragraph (a) above to the contrary notwithstanding, the College may terminate this Lease Agreement and shall have no obligation to BayCare to restore the Leased Premises in the event that the Leased Premises or any portion thereof is destroyed or substantially damaged by fire or other casualty, if: (i) the fire or other casualty is caused by the acts, omissions or negligence of BayCare, its officers, directors, employees, agents, contractors, or invitees; (ii) the Leased Premises is damaged in whole or in part as a result of a risk that is not covered by the College's insurance policies; or (iii) the insurance proceeds are inadequate to restore the Leased Premises to substantially the same condition as the Leased Premises was in immediately before the happening of the casualty.
- 27. PUBLIC RECORDS/STUDENT RECORDS. The provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes; Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA); and Section 1002.22, Florida Statutes shall apply to this Lease Agreement.
- 28. NOTICES. All notices given to BayCare hereunder shall be forwarded to BayCare at the following address, until the College is notified otherwise:

- 29. CONSTRUCTION OF LEASE. This contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Any changes in the applicable laws, which govern this Lease, will necessitate a change in Lease terms and conditions, which may be effected thereby, at the time such changes may arise.
- 30. LOSS; DAMAGE; INJURY; DEFECTS. BayCare shall store its property in and shall occupy the Leased Premises at its own risk. The College shall not be responsible or liable at any time for damage to BayCare's merchandise, equipment, fixtures or other personal property of BayCare or BayCare's business regardless of the cause, unless such damage is due to the College's negligence or wrongful act. The College shall not be responsible or liable to BayCare for damage to either person or property that

may be occasioned by or through the acts or omissions of third parties. Unless due to the College's negligence, wrongful act, or failure to comply with this Lease Agreement, the College shall not be liable for any defect in the District Office, or parking area or any of the equipment, machinery, utilities, appliances or apparatus therein, nor shall it be responsible or liable for any damage to any person or to any property of BayCare or other person caused by the running, backing up, seepage, or overflow of water or sewage in any part of the Leased Premises, the failure of any public utility in supplying utilities to the Leased Premises or for any damage caused by or resulting from any defect or negligence in the occupancy, construction, operation, use of any of the Leased Premises, District Office, equipment, machinery, utilities, appliances or apparatus by any other person or by or from the acts of negligence of any occupant of the Leased Premises or the District Office.


- 31. SEVERABILITY. If any clause or provision herein shall be adjudged invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction or by operation of any applicable law, it shall not affect the validity of any other clause or provision, which shall remain in full force and effect.
- WAIVER. The failure of either party to enforce any of the provisions of this Lease shall not be considered a waiver of that provision or the right of the party to thereafter enforce the provision.
- 33. COMPLETE AGREEMENT. This Lease constitutes the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and may not be modified except by an instrument in writing and signed by the parties.
- 34. COUNTERPARTS. This Lease may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be effective only on delivery and thereafter shall be deemed an original, and all of which shall be taken to be one and the same instrument, for the same effect as if all parties hereto had signed the same signature page. Any signature page of this Lease may be detached from any counterpart of this Lease without impairing the legal effect of any signatures thereon and may be attached to another counterpart of this Lease identical in form hereto but having attached to it one or more additional signature pages.
- 35. INSTALLATION OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT. The College shall dedicate space in Room 162B, the Intermediate Distribution Facility, (the "IDF Room") for BayCare to install the equipment necessary to provide wireless internet and intranet services. BrightHouse Networks shall connect the hard wiring to the equipment located in the IDF Room. The wiring shall initially be brought into the District Office facility by BrightHouse Networks through the College's Main Distribution Facility, and thereafter connected to BayCare's equipment in the IDF Room. The College shall be responsible for installation of the wiring from the IDF Room to each individual classroom comprising the Leased Premises necessary to bring wireless capabilities to those classrooms. BayCare shall be solely responsible for obtaining and installing antennas in each classroom which will transmit the wireless signals. In the event that there is problem with the wireless connection during the Term or any renewal thereof, BayCare shall be responsible for placing a Work Order to the College in accordance with Paragraph 5 Maintenance and Security to evaluate the problem. If the College is unable to determine the source of the problem or if the problem involves something other than the wiring installed by the

College from the IDF Room to the classrooms, then BayCare shall be solely responsible for any and all costs and repairs, including the hiring of contractors approved by the College, to remedy the connection problems. BayCare shall indemnify and hold the College harmless from any and all losses or damages incurred by BayCare, its officers, employees, agents and invitees resulting from any failures or inability to connect to the wireless services, whether or not such failure in connection was caused by the College.

The College will provide BayCare with telephone equipment and service for each classroom and in the office spaces. Only Rooms 164b and 164c shall have long distance capabilities. The remaining Rooms where telephone service is provided as set forth herein shall have local and 911 dialing capabilities only. BayCare shall be charged a flat fee of \$50 per month for the phone services provided by the College to BayCare as set forth herein.

EGS 1001 INTRODUCTION TO ENGINEERING

3 credits

Prerequisite: MAC 1105 or any MAC prefix. This is an introductory course with an overview of the engineering professions and the skills required to become a good engineer. The student is introduced to engineering work habits, responsibilities, engineering communication, engineering fundamentals, and problem solving techniques used across all engineering disciplines. 47 contact hours.

Confirmation is sought to <u>change the following courses</u> effective Term II, 2009-2010, subject to Board of Trustees' approval:

MAN 3930 SEMINARS IN BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT

1 credit

Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS Program in the College of Technology and Management, or permission of the Dean. This course focuses on current and emerging issues in business and management. Its format and topics will vary but will typically be a full day or a half-day seminar conducted by one or more industry subject-matter experts who will address a specific business and management topic such as financial markets, international trade, human resources, cultural issues, or economic subjects, etc. The requirements of each student will vary with the topics in question. This course may be taken 3 times for a total of 3 credits using different seminar topics. 16 contact hours.

GLOBALIZATION: NEW CHALLENGES FOR TAMPA BAY AREA 1 credit Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS Program in the College of Technology and Management, or permission of the Dean. This specific section of the Seminars in Business and Management course focuses on current and emerging globalization challenges confronting the local region. Its format and topics will include a half-day to one-day seminar by a practicing economic development professional or regulator, a pre-seminar activity involving the reading of relevant literature related to the subject globalization issues, and a post-

seminar activity to reinforce the information, concepts, and issues presented at the seminar. 16 contact hours.

INTERNATIONAL STUDY ABROAD

1 credit

Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS Program in the College of Technology and Management, or permission of the Dean. The student may participate in a "study abroad trip" respective to their studies in International Business, Technology Management or Banking. The nature and location of the trip will be approved by the College Dean and faculty. Typically a two week study abroad trip will explore various issues pertaining to international business (globalization), marketing, entrepreneurship, law or technology related to the country or location visited. The student may earn 1 credit for the seminar/study. 16 contact hours.

E-GOVERNANCE

1 cred

Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS program in the College of Technology and Management or permission of the Dean. This seminar focuses on the use of information and communications technology to create and transfer knowledge on electronic governance (e-governance) and electronic democracy (e-democracy) associated with the e-Governance Academy and the Government of Estonia. E-governance and e-democracy provides a mechanism for analyzing and systematizing international and domestic experiences allowing the creation of a knowledge base and experience model where the knowledge can be transferred to interested parties and government agencies. 16 contact hours.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP: FOCUSING ON INNOVATION 1 credit Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS program in the College of Technology and Management or permission of the Dean. This seminar focuses on key elements of successful Entrepreneurship. Entrepreneurship concepts in the seminar may include issues such as new market venture ideas, financing options for a new business, how to get a new product to market, product branding, business leadership and innovation, defining business development and successfully using incubators in a new business. 16 contact hours.

IMPORTING AND EXPORTING OF TECHNOLOGY AND SECURITY 1 credit Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS program in the College of Technology and Management or permission of the Dean. This seminar focuses on the emerging topics and considerations associated with import and export controls on high technology. Current legal requirements as governed by the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) and regulations under the Export Administration Act (EAA) will be examined. Emerging technology and exports to outlawed countries will be explored. 16 contact hours.

SUSTAINABILITY/GREEN MANAGEMENT CONCEPTS

1 credit Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. Admission to any BAS Program in the College of Technology and Management, or permission of the Dean. This course focuses on current and emerging issues in business sustainability/green. Its format will vary but will typically include a ½ day to one day seminar by one or more industry experts. Depending on the seminar specific topic, the expert(s) will address specific business and management topics pertaining to sustainable business planning, such as social and environmental challenges, marketing and supply chain decisions, recycling, reusing, reconditioning, product and service decisions in order to realize a natural competitive advantage within their operating strategies, international policies and regulations, and sustainability/green issues, as well as laws associated with this subject matter. 16 contact hours.

DOMESTIC TO GLOBAL

1 credit

Prerequisite: Admission to Banking BAS, International Business BAS, Management and Organizational Leadership BAS, Sustainability Management BAS, or Technology Management BAS. This will be a special topics conference focusing on issues surrounding expansion of domestic companies to multinational status, with a particular concentration on Dubai. This specific conference will address the issues from both Dubai's standpoint as well as the United States. The participants will be industry experts, government officials and academic representatives discussing the overall objectives of an expansion and the risk involved in the expansion. It may also include a focus on basic market research to determine an initial country fit as well as the knowledge necessary to determine whether the potential host country's government is stable and will support the expansion. Of primary importance may be a discussion regarding the main issues affecting expansion including the potential host country's economy, financial markets, risk analysis, business culture and legal system. The home country's laws and the "process for success" will also need to be addressed in order to properly evaluate the expansion. 16 contact hours.

Approval is sought for the following courses to be added effective Term III, 2009-2010:

ACG 2940 **ACCOUNTING INTERNSHIP**

1-4 credits

Prerequisite: Academic Department Coordinator/Chair Approval. This course is to be taken after the student has completed 9 credit hours in their major field of study. The purpose of this course is to allow students a "real world" experience with major-related, supervised, evaluated practical work experiences which may be paid or voluntary. Students are graded on the basis of documented learning acquired through hands-on experiences in an actual work setting. Variable credits are available, one to four per course. The student must fulfill the requirement of 60 on-the-job hours for each credit earned in addition to written assignments. This course may be repeated for a total of 4 credits.

BRC 2940 FINANCIAL SERVICES INTERNSHIP

1-4 credits

The purpose of this course is to allow students a "real world" experience with major-related, supervised, evaluated practical work experiences which may be paid or voluntary. COP 2940 COMPUTER/WEB PROGRAMMING INTERNSHIP

Prerequisites: <u>Admission to the Nursing BS program</u>, NUR 3125, NUR 3805. This course focuses on client assessment, health risks and formation of nursing diagnoses and health teaching. Emphasis is on the process of client interaction and use of appraisal skills in the collection of bio-psychosocial data across the life span. Application of pathophysiological concepts is required. 75 contact hours.

NUR 4636 COMMUNITY HEALTH NURSING THEORY

3 credits

Prerequisite: <u>Admission to the Nursing BS program</u>, NUR 3805. Corequisite: NUR 4636L. This course focuses on the holistic nursing role in the community. Emphasis is on concepts and theories related to community health nursing. Special attention is given to the community as client with emphasis on health promotion/disease prevention and teaching of groups in community settings. 45 contact hours.

NUR 4636L COMMUNITY HEALTH NURSING PRACTICUM

4 credits

Prerequisite: <u>Admission to the Nursing BS program</u>, NUR 3805, NUR 3066C and corequisite: NUR 4636. This course offers opportunities to practice the principles and theory of community health nursing in a variety of health care settings. Included are the identification of health care needs of the community as a client, and the nurse's role as a facilitator, teacher, and evaluator in promoting and maintaining health and wellness. 60 contact hours.

NUR 4835 LEADERSHIP THEORY

3 credits

Prerequisite: NUR 3805 and admission to the Nursing BS program; <u>corequisite: NUR 4835L.</u> This course includes a focus on theories, concepts, and principles of leading and managing as well as pertinent legal issues faced by nursing leaders and managers. Emphasis will be on the methods to become an effective leader/manager including interpersonal skills needed for effective leadership and management, the different types of organizations delivering health care, outcomes management, and analysis of current research findings. 45 contact hours.

NUR 4835L LEADERSHIP PRACTICUM

4 credits

Prerequisite: <u>Admission to the program</u>, NUR 3145, NUR 3655, NUR 3826, NUR 4165, NUR 4606, NUR 4636, NUR 4636L. Co or prerequisite: NUR 4835, NUR 3826. This course focuses on the application of the theories, concepts, and principles of leading and managing. Emphasis in the course will be on the development of skills needed for effective leadership and management.

Opportunities will be provided to demonstrate appropriate leadership and management ability. 60 contact hours.
