Authorization is sought to continue as a subcontractor whereby St. Petersburg College's Southeastern Public Safety Institute provides counterdrug training throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands as part of the National Guard's counterdrug initiative as set forth in the original statement of work and amended annually. Funding for the College's services will be provided through congressional appropriations to the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD)—earmarked to the College's Multijurisdictional Counterdrug Task Force Training (MCTFT) department – through the National Guard Bureau (NGB). The College receives funding via a cost reimbursable contract with Florida's Department of Military Affairs (DMA), Florida National Guard (FLNG). See attached Information Summary for additional information. Permission is sought to enter into the necessary contractual agreements, as appropriate, and to accept funding for this program.

The total amount of estimated appropriation for the fiscal year October 1, 2010 through September 30, 2011 is up to \$3.0 million. Of this amount, it is anticipated that approximately \$400,000 may be withheld by NGB, on the College's behalf, to pay for administration, salaries/benefits of Guard personnel assigned to the program and up to \$40,000 may be held by DMA, on the College's behalf, to pay for specific expenses associated with the program such as shipping, military vehicle maintenance, counter drug instructional textbooks and other operational expenditures related to MCTFT. Accordingly, the actual contract between the College and the Department of Military Affairs is anticipated to be up to \$2.6 million. Contract amounts may be increased or decreased depending on final appropriation amounts. Exact figures for the 2010-11 fiscal year will be presented to the Board after the U.S. Department of Defense releases final funding. Such funding will allow the College to provide personnel, facilities, equipment and supplies to operate and manage the MCTFT program. SPC also expects to recover approximately 5% of the total contract amount as indirect support.

Total Funding for 2009-10: Final funding for the 2009-10 fiscal year has been received. The total appropriation for this period, October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010, was \$5,524,101. Of this amount, \$396,363 was held by NGB, on the College's behalf, to pay for salaries/benefits of Guard personnel assigned to the program and \$100,000 was held by DMA, on the College's behalf, to pay for specific expenses associated with the program including shipping, military vehicle maintenance, counter drug instructional textbooks and other operational expenditures related to MCTFT. Accordingly, the actual contract between the College and the Department of Military Affairs for fiscal year 2009-10 was \$5,027,738.

Confirmation is sought for a grant award that was submitted, subject to Board of Trustees' approval, to the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Postsecondary Education, to receive approximately \$314,128 to conduct a Center of Excellence for Veteran Student Success from October 1, 2010 through September 30, 2013. Permission is also sought to enter into any necessary contractual agreements, if awarded

The goal of the Center of Excellence for Veteran Student Success is to not only serve veteran students but to proactively seek out individuals from underrepresented groups. Some of the strategies to achieve this goal are: 1) Conducting recruitment efforts in the midtown area of St. Petersburg, an area whose population is primarily comprised of African Americans, and in Clearwater's large Hispanic community; and 2) Working with Disability Resources offices on the campuses to ensure veteran students with disabilities are aware of the services available to them. Understanding that veterans are not comfortable disclosing disabilities, especially those that are "hidden" such as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, efforts will be made by project staff to make it easy and comfortable to access disability resources and to ensure veteran students of confidentiality. Some steps that will be taken to help veterans overcome their concerns about disclosing disability are: 1) Ensure that disability resources staff visit the Centers and become familiar to the veteran students in informal ways; 2) Ask veteran students who have successfully used the services offered to encourage their peers to do the same; and 3) Relax, wherever possible, the need for extensive documentation for a veteran student to qualify for services.

The award funds will be used to pay personnel hired to support program activities. Other expenditures include travel expenses, supplies, contractual services, and other services. St. Petersburg College will provide a voluntary in-kind match of \$304,233 in personnel funds and \$109,254 in fringe benefits for a total of \$413,757.

Confirmation/approval is sought with respect to the following grant/restricted funds contract item(s) which were previously approved, but have been amended, modified, extended and/or need additional clarification.

• Agreement initially approved November 21, 2006 and further modified with the U.S. Department of Defense, Space and Naval Warfare Systems Command (SPAWAR) whereby the College's National Terrorism Preparedness Institute (NTPI) provides research and development to design, develop, test and implement training technologies focused on state-of-the-art Advanced Distributed Learning technologies and processes for activities involving the combating terrorism community. NTPI has also provided deliverables under previous contract modifications for the Universal Core/Federal Force Tracker Pilot project; the Maritime Integrated Command and Control Alerting Tool Suite (MICATS); and the Information Assurance Contractor Training and Certification. The total contract amount at this time is \$5,459,047.

This item is to update the Board that SPAWAR has requested additional modifications to the Agreement. Specifically, the modifications will: extend the period of performance through January 14, 2011 (Modification #7); incorporate the Employment Eligibility Verification (E-verify) clause into the contract (Modification #8); add the Manpower Reporting Tool with corresponding Contract Data Requirements List and modify the List of Exhibits/Attachments to reference previously added information, including the MICATS statement of work (Modification #9). All other terms and conditions will remain as previously approved/advised.

This Board memo approved Spot Survey #3 for the site acquisition of the Ulmerton Road property where we are constructing the new Veterinary Technology Building.

Additionally, this Board memo advised that the St. Petersburg College Foundation would purchase the Ulmerton Road property (purchase price of \$725,000 that was partially funded by a private donation of \$575,898 specifically for the Veterinary Technology Building and matched as part of the Facilities Enhancement Challenge Grant) and that the College would purchase the property from the St. Petersburg College Foundation at a later date for approximately \$175,000 (which includes the variance between the purchase price and the donation, as well as all acquisition and legal costs associated with the purchase of the property).

In the approved PECO funding list for 2010-2011, the College received \$175,000 for the site acquisition of the Ulmerton Road property.

Amendment #3 to the Educational Plant Survey dated June 19, 2007, (Spot Survey #3) (Veterinary Technology Special Purpose Center, Site 18)

Amendment #1 to the Educational Plant Survey dated June 19, 2007 (Spot Survey #1), was approved by the Board on March 18, 2008 (see attached). This Amendment established a new site as the Veterinary Technology Center, Site Number 18, at the School Board of Pinellas County Seminole Vocational Education Center.

It has now been determined that the Veterinary Technology Center will be located at a new site on Ulmerton Road. This Amendment changes the site location from the School Board of Pinellas County Seminole Vocational Educational Center to a new property on Ulmerton Road adjacent to the Pinellas County Animal Services Buildings. Further, this property is being purchased by the St. Petersburg College Foundation (partially funded by a private donation), and the College will enter into a 40-year lease agreement with the Foundation for the property.

This Amendment provides the ability for the College to request site acquisition funds to allow St. Petersburg College to purchase the Veterinary Technology Center Site from the St. Petersburg College Foundation once PECO funds become available. The amount requested for this purchase will be the difference between the purchase price of the property and the private donation, approximately \$175,000.

We propose a 45-day due diligence period and would attempt to close on the property before the end of 2010. The agreement outlining all details will be presented to the Board for final approval.

SUBJECT: Renewal of College's Stop Loss Policy

Approval is sought to renew the College's stop-loss policy for its self-funded health plan effective October 1, 2010, according to the agreed-upon terms. The College carries stop-loss coverage on specific (individual person) as well as overall aggregate (college-wide) claims to reduce its risk of catastrophic loss. The recommendation includes adjustment to coverage levels based on low claim levels in recent years. The College will re-evaluate the coverage levels as part of an overall review of the plan coverage leading into the 2011-12 plan year.

The College's policy would continue with Symetra Financial. The Symetra Financial aggregate and specific stop-loss premium is \$282,300, which represents a decrease of 37.1% from the previous year. The terms of the agreement are as follows:

The proposed revisions will also update the Rule to provide that students who have any combination of two failures in the following Nursing courses will be dismissed and unable to return to the Nursing Program: Nursing I NUR 1021C; Nursing II NUR 1211C; Nursing III NUR 2462C; Nursing IV 2731C; Transition to Professional Nursing NUR 1001C; and Nursing Care Management NUR 2811C. Submitted by Phil Nicotera.

6Hx23-6.9017 Information Technology Security Policy The proposed revisions will update the Rule and add provisions to enhance data security on portable media. *Submitted by Doug Duncan*.

6Hx23-4.69 REQUIREMENTS OF THE NURSING PROGRAM

I. Progression Requirements:

Students who are eligible to start the first specialty course in the program must submit a Health Programs Application form to be enrolled in that course. Enrolling in the first specialty course, students must continue to meet progression requirements. Students to be admitted will be determined by the Health Programs Special Rules, 6Hx23-4.53, Section I. D.

- A. Minimum requirements for registration into the first specialty course are as follows:
 - 1. Completion of all college preparatory course work.
 - Standard (Scaled Score) of 95 on the reading subsection of the Florida College Entry Level Placement Test, equivalent score on other standardized tests as recommended by the nursing faculty and approved by President's Cabinet, or have a Master's degree or higher from a regionally accredited university or college, or earn "C" or better in REA 1105.
 - 3. Candidates who have had previous courses in another registered nursing program must submit a transcript from the school of nursing and a reference from the official head of the program or appropriate designate. An "individual learning plan" will be developed for each transferring in student by the SPC Nursing faculty that delineates the completion of the nursing program in order to graduate from SPC.
 - 4. Completion of a minimum of 11 credits in Nursing preentry general education and support courses with a 2.75 minimum grade point average on a 4.00 scale and a 2.75 minimum grade point average on a 4.00 scale in the following courses that are being considered for admission: BSC 2085, BSC 2085L, BSC 2086, BSC 2086L, MCB 2010, and MCB 2010L.
 - Computer/Information Literacy Competency (no minimum credit hours required). Computer/Information literacy competency may be demonstrated by completing one of the following:
 - a. Passing a College approved Basic Computer/Information Skills Competency Test: or

- b. Successful completion of at least one of the following:
 - 1) CTS 1101 Basic Computer and Information Literacy.
 - 2) CGS 1100 Microcomputer Applications (as revised in 2002) or LIS 1102, CGS 1510 and OST 1741.
 - 3) EME 2040 Introduction to Educational Technology (as revised in 2002), preferred for Education majors.
- B. All pre-entry, general education and support courses must be completed with a minimum grade of "C".
- C. Each student selected must have a physical examination and required immunizations, titers and/or screenings prior to entrance into the first year of the Nursing Program. These must be updated as required while in the program.
- D. All progression requirements for health related programs (6Hx23-4.53) apply to the Nursing Program.
- E. Students must complete the pre-entry science and support course requirements within three attempts.
- F. Consideration for readmission into the nursing program after having failed or withdrawn from any course in the first session of the Nursing Program will require the student to go through the selective admission process.
- G. Students transferring from another Nursing program must be in good standing in such program.
- H. Students must have a valid <u>American Heart Association</u> Health Care Provider CPR Certification prior to entrance into the first year of the Nursing Program. The certification must be kept current throughout the program.
- II. For the transitional program for practical nurses licensed in Florida, a course is specially designed as entry point for licensed practical nurses or other special students. Special students are defined as students who have satisfactorily completed course work deemed to be equivalent to that of an LPN. Students who successfully complete NUR 1001C, Orientation to Technical Nursing Therapy, Clinical Experience and NUR 1001, Orientation to Technical Nursing Therapy, will enter the sophomore class.

- A. Minimum requirements for consideration of licensed practical nurses and special students are the same as I.A., B., C., D., E., F., G. & H. above and in addition:
 - 1. Be currently licensed in Florida (or eligible for license by transfer of license from out of state).
 - 2. Completion of the following courses with grades as defined in I.A.:

PSY 1012 -- General Psychology

BSC 2085/2085L -- Human Anatomy and Physiology and Laboratory I

BSC 2086/2086L -- Human Anatomy and Physiology and Laboratory II

3. Additional pre-entry course requirements include:

College approved Humanities elective (Applicants who have earned an Associate in Arts, Baccalaureate, or higher degree from an accredited institution are waived from this requirement.)

- 4. For those LPN transitional students entering in May (day schedule), it is recommended they have most, if not all, general education and support courses completed.
- III. For the transitional program for paramedics (evening track), the following are the minimum requirements for consideration as an applicant to the freshman class:
 - A. As outlined in I.A., B., C., D., E., F., G. & H. above.
 - B. Additional requirements:
 - Must have completed 25 pre-entry, general education or support credits. These MUST include 8 hours of anatomy and physiology, 3 hours of English, and 3 hours of PSY 1012. The other 11 hours are the student's choice from required pre-entry, general education and support curriculum.
 - 2. Must have received an AS in Emergency Medical Services or have taken equivalent general education/ support courses.
 - 3. Must be currently a state certified paramedic.

IV. Students who have any combination of two failures in the following nursing courses listed below will be dismissed and unable to return to the program:

Nursing I Theory/Clinical NUR 1021C; Nursing II Theory/Clinical NUR 1211C; Nursing III Theory/Clinical NUR 2462C; Nursing IV Theory/Clinical NUR 2731C; Transition to Professional Nursing NUR 1001C; and Nursing Care Management NUR 2811C.

- V. Classes may be offered during the day or evening schedule depending upon the availability of classes within the program. Evening is defined as 1:00 p.m. 11:00 p.m.
- VI. In addition to SPC graduation requirements, students must meet these special graduation requirements:
 - A. A grade of "C" or better in each of the designated specialty courses in this program.
 - B. A grade of "C" or better in all courses in the Nursing Program.
 - C. A valid <u>American Heart Association</u> Health Care Provider C.P.R. certificate.
 - D. For transfer students, completion of the "individual learning plan."
 - E. Students must satisfactorily complete an end of program competency assessment examination in theory and an end of program clinical evaluation.

6Hx23-6.9017 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY COMPUTER SECURITY POLICY

I. Purpose & Intent

This policy is intended to establish minimum IT security standards for workstations, portable computers and personal data assistants (PDA's) that reside inside of St. Petersburg College's Internet firewall.

II. Compliance Requirements

All users shall be required to attend security training in order to understand the protections that each computer system automatically applies, the basic protective measures that are maintained by campus support technicians (TRSs) or information systems, and their role in ensuring compliance.

A. Identification Information

The management or designee of each College campus, site or department must work with Information Systems or Property Records, as the case may be, to maintain up to date records identifying the user or user group utilizing a given College owned computer system.

B. Computer Security

- 1. All computers shall be configured to have a password-enabled screen saver. This security lockout feature shall automatically initiate after the computer remains idle from user interaction after a predefined time period. A user must then reenter their password to gain access to the computer. Exceptions may be granted for special purpose systems (Kiosk, etc.) whose operation may be adversely impacted while running a screen saver. Where possible, technical resource staff shall initially configure these settings. The user is responsible for ensuring that the feature remains enabled.
- 2. All workstations, portable computers, and PDA's must be updated with the latest security patches, virus scanning software and virus data files (where applicable). Patches for high-risk vulnerabilities shall be installed within 24 hours of notification. Where possible, technical resource staff shall configure automatic security updates. The user is responsible for ensuring that the patching remains current.
- 3. All software installed on College computers must be College owned or licensed through the College. Exceptions to the

above restriction must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the Administrative Information Systems (AIS) software license administrator. Technical resource staff performing initial software installation shall verify proper licensing. The user is responsible for ensuring that any software installed by the user is in accordance with this Rule.

- 4. Installation, introduction or connection of administration domains (forests, NT4 domains, or workgroups) to College networks is prohibited, unless prior approval is obtained from the College's director of Network Systems. In the absence of the director of Network Systems, the <u>associate</u> vice president of Information Systems may authorize such access.
- 5. All PDA's used to connect directly to College computers must be College owned. Exceptions to this must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the College's director of Network Systems.
- Computers shall not have software or services installed that could interfere with traditional network services or routing services (e.g.: Dynamic Routing Protocols, DHCP, BootP, PxE, RARP...).
- 7. The use of remote access technology or remote file sharing mechanisms which grant access to College computers from outside the College firewalls (e.g.: PC-Anywhere, GotoMyPC, VNC, NetMeeting, Remote Desktop, SSH, Telnet server, FTP server, IRC...) is strictly prohibited without the written permission of the College's director of Network Systems.
- 8. Workstations, portable computers, and PDA's should be reasonably secured.

C. Computer Data Security

- 1. Personal and sensitive information, including, but not limited to, names, addresses, and SSNs should only be downloaded to perform duties outlined in the employee's position description.
- 2. Effective in 2008-09, new laptop computers assigned to employees whose job duties require storage of personal and sensitive information shall use encryption technology to

protect such sensitive information in the event of loss or theft of the laptop. Exceptions to this must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the College's <u>associate</u> vice president of Information Systems.

- All storage media must be completely overwritten with random information prior to disposal or transfer to another entity (including hard disks, tape media, floppy disks, and any other writable media). If media cannot be overwritten, media shall be destroyed.
- 4. <u>Server based systems are to be used whenever possible for storage, transmission or processing of sensitive data.</u>
- 5. Portable storage devices such as hard drives, DVDs, CDs and USB flash drives may not be used to store student or employee personal or sensitive information from any College-owned database. Exceptions to this must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the College's associate vice president of Information Systems.
- 6. <u>Portable devices used to store College data must make use</u> of encryption technology to fully secure the data.
- III. Enforcement and Consequences

Violation of this policy may result in the revocation of access to St. Petersburg College information technology resources.

Variance Analysis:

Revenues

State Government funding is 11% greater than budgeted as the State has historically not made payments for Upper Division funding in July or August of the year; however, that portion is included now that all funding is from the Community College Program Funds.

Student Fees increased over budget due to the enrollment growth experienced beyond that anticipated in the budget.

Other Revenue is higher than budget primarily due to greater revenue than anticipated from the Use of College Facilities at this point in the year.

Fund Transfers In has a small negative variance due to budget trending, which included a \$5k Non-Mandatory Transfer In from Unrestricted Funds that occurred in July of last year but not again this year.


Expenses

Personnel expenses has a positive variance to budget primarily due to vacant positions (both open positions and new positions that were added during the budget process that are not yet filled).


Current Expenses are only slightly below budget, primarily due to fee waivers lower than anticipated for this point in the year.

Capital expenses is higher than budget primarily due to a strategic change that has enabled the purchase of approved capital items earlier in the year than in prior years.


FY10-11 Monthly Revenue and Expense Recurring Version

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





Points of Interest from Financial Reports for June 30, 2010:

Net Assets or Fund Balance for the entire College increased by \$10 million.

The Unrestricted Fund balance (Fund 10, 14 & 16) increased \$3.6 million due to increased enrollments, tuition rates and the addition of the technology fee. State funding decreased but was largely offset by the stimulus stabilization funding shown as Federal Support or Other Revenue. Expenses included a \$5 million transfer to the Unexpended Plant Fund to cover construction costs incurred. Personnel expenses increased, attributable to adjunct faculty growth in support of the enrollment increase as well as increasing costs for benefits across all personnel groups.

The Baccalaureate Fund balance (Fund 12 & 17) increased \$1.6 million primarily due to program and enrollment growth. State funding decreased but largely offset by the stimulus stabilization funding shown as Federal Support or Other Revenue. Personnel expenses increased for both full-time and adjunct faculty in support of the program and enrollment growth.

The Auxiliary Fund balance (Fund 30) increased \$0.6 million as more funds were transferred to other funds to be spent on student recruitment and student services.

The Scholarship/Short-term Loan Fund balance (Funds 40 & 50) decreased \$0.7 million primarily due to the \$0.9 million Short-term Loan Program shifting to the NelNet Payment Plan Program in the Spring term of 2009-2010. The short-term loan funds were transferred back to the Unrestricted Current Fund. The affect of that transfer was partially offset by increased Federal grants revenues and student financial aid fees.

The Unexpended Plant Fund balance (Fund70) increased \$4.3 million driven by the \$5 million transfer in from the Unrestricted Current fund to cover constructions costs previously incurred with no future funding available.

The Debt Service and Investment in Plant Fund balance (Fund 80 & 90) increased \$0.08 million driven by the net effect of capitalized asset additions offset by depreciation expense.



Enrollment Status








Student Age






Student Gender








FTIC Financial Aid Award





FTIC Race/Ethnicity






FTIC Age






FTIC Gender

SUBJECT: Proposed Memorandum of Understanding between St. Petersburg College

and the Job Corps Program

Recently the City of St. Petersburg resolved some legal matters that cleared the way for the opening of the Job Corps Center in the Midtown Community. These Centers are operated by private companies under the purview of the U.S. Department of Labor.

The Job Corps Centers provide entry-level training in a large number of occupational areas. In addition, the Job Corps Center will provide GED training as a component of their educational offerings.

Most of the students in the Job Corps programs are focused on successful completion of their training and entry into productive employment. For some students, the possibility of going beyond the Job Corps training is in their goals. Toward that end, it is helpful for the College to have an established relationship with the Job Corps Center, focused on assisting students to move into courses and programs at the College. The attached Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between our two organizations is intended to document that emerging relationship.

As St. Petersburg College continues to develop its range of workforce options, we will want to be a reliable partner with others who are working toward similar goals. I believe the MOU will allow us to grow a comfortable partnership with an emergent training institution in our community.

Approval and Board support of the attached Memorandum of Understanding, pending final legal review, is recommended.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Between

ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE

&

CORNERSTONE SOLUTIONS INC. - U.S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR, JOB CORPS

St. Petersburg College (SPC), and Cornerstone Solutions Inc. (CSI), a U. S. Department of Labor Job Corps Service Contractor, recognize the need for a cooperative service relationship between their respective organizations. Therefore, by this formal Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), each agrees to enter into such a cooperative service Partnership on or about November 1, 2010.

The mission of St. Petersburg College "is to provide accessible, affordable, high-quality education by keeping the learner's needs at the center of decision-making and working in partnership with its dynamic, multi-cultural community." The mission of Cornerstone Solutions Inc. is to deliver solutions, programs, and services that add value and demonstrably beneficial outcomes to customers, constituents, and the community, while maintaining our uncompromising core values in everything we do." Job Corps is "a **free** education and training program that helps young people learn a career, earn a high school diploma or GED, and find and keep a good job. For eligible youth at least 16 years of age, Job Corps provides the all-around skills needed to succeed in a career and in life." These philosophies form the foundation for a sound partnership to facilitate the transition of eligible Job Corps students to St. Petersburg College.

Job Corps students who have successfully earned a high school diploma or GED will have the opportunity to seek matriculation into SPC's Associate and Bachelor Degree programs; SPC's credit certificate programs, as well as the GED Preparation and testing program (Adult Education).

Through this partnership, Job Corps graduates meeting St. Petersburg College's admission requirements will enroll in appropriate higher education courses (as determined by placement scores) consistent with their Career Ladder and Career Pathways, subject to the fee structure at SPC.

St. Petersburg College Agrees to:

- ➤ Provide college awareness information sessions to Job Corps students, including workshops that focus on federal and state financial aid opportunities and scholarships. These sessions will take place onsite at the Pinellas Job Corps Center as well as via educational field trips to SPC for local Job Corps students.
- ➤ Provide transition services to Job Corps students, including pre-admissions counseling, placement testing, academic and career advisement, consistent with the student's specified Career Pathway.
- ➤ Provide to Job Corps students the full complement of SPC course offerings, depending on a student's admissions eligibility and placement, to include continuing education programming, and Adult Education and GED preparation programs.
- ➤ Provide a campus liaison/advisor at each of the SPC (9) campuses that is designated to handle admission and enrollment processes of Job Corps students.
- > Provide to CSI/Job Corps verification of students' matriculation at SPC.

Cornerstone Solutions, Inc. on behalf of Job Corps Agrees to:

- → Develop and maintain a solid, cooperative working relationship with representatives of SPC to facilitate the promotion of SPC's educational offerings, academic and student support services to Job Corps students.
- ➤ Provide preliminary eligibility screening of Job Corps students and refer them to SPC accordingly prior to students separation.
- ➤ Host SPC personnel on-site at Job Corps Centers to conduct presentations and workshops, relative to the institution's comprehensive programs of study and services.
- Establish center liaisons at feeder centers to process the admission and enrollment process of Job Corps Students matriculating to SPC.
- Assist SPC bound Job Corps students with the completion of the SPC Admissions Application, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and the gathering of required documentation to supplement both applications.
- ➤ Inform and assist Job Corps students with all financial/tuition requirements

MOU Standard Terms and Conditions:

- 1. Neither party shall use the other party's name, trademarks or logos without the express written consent of that party.
- 2. As a political subdivision of the State of Florida, all provisions herein, shall at all times be subject to any and all Florida laws, Florida regulations and the District Board of Trustees Rules which are applicable to St. Petersburg College's operations, commitments and/or activities in furtherance of any terms specified herein.
- 3. During the term of this MOU, neither party shall discriminate against any person on the basis of race, color, religion, gender, national or ethnic origin, disability or veteran or marital status.
- 4. Nothing contained in this MOU shall grant, imply, or intend that either party shall have any right or authority to create any obligation or responsibility, express or implied, on behalf of or in the name of the other party, or to bind the other party contractually in any manner whatsoever absent the other party's joinder in writing.
- 5. Notice shall be effective if delivered by U.S. Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested, or by recognized overnight courier delivery to the respective Administrators identified by each party.
- 6. Either party may terminate this MOU without cause at any time upon sixty (60) days advance written notice provided, however, that all work and services rendered up to the effective date of termination shall be fully paid at the time thereof.
- 7. Any amendment or modification of this MOU must be in writing and signed by an authorized representative of the parties.
- 8. Each party and the person signing this MOU represents and warrants that they are authorized to sign this MOU on behalf of their respective organization as the act and deed of that organization, and that such organization agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions of this MOU.
