- <u>10-229.</u> The meeting was convened by the chairman at 8:30 a.m. The invocation was given by Mr. Johnston, remembering the loss of former staff member Shirley Crane. The invocation was immediately followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. On behalf of the Board, Chairman Burke added comforting words honoring the Crane family.
- <u>10-230.</u> Dr. Law recommended adoption of retirement resolutions for Jacqueline A. Addis Career Development Center, Tarpon Springs Campus; Mary L. McCulloch, Academic Resource Commons, St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus; and Janislaw Wisniewski, Facilities Services, St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus. Mr. Wisniewski was in attendance and, joined by colleagues, received his resolution as presented by Chairman Burke and President Law. Mrs. Bilirakis moved to adopt the resolutions. Mr. Johnston seconded the motion. Mr. Johnston voted aye; Mr. Burke voted aye; Mr. Brett voted aye; and Mrs. Bilirakis voted aye. Motion carried.
- **10-231.** Opportunity was given for comments from the Board Chair, Board Members and the President.

Chairman Burke commented on the following:

- Meaningful welcome event hosted by the University of South Florida (USF) St. Petersburg Board members in honor of Dr. Law. Mr. Johnston reiterated an earlier request for SPC to return the hospitality and maintain the camaraderie. Mr. Burke concurred the two Boards should meet in an effort to better the partnership and achieve meaningful results.
- First-ever community college summit being hosted by the White House on October 5.
- Successful and meaningful Fall Faculty event held at the Coliseum. Mr. Johnston added it was very rewarding and stressed the importance of Board presence in support of the faculty, who are one of the mainstays of the institution.
- Bilirakis College of Education topping out event at the Tarpon Springs Campus. Mrs. Bilirakis gave a brief report and thanked Dr. Law for a wonderful event.
- Upcoming event at the Leepa-Rattner Museum of Art (LRMA) Lights On! LRMA whereby Dr. Janice Buchanan, Development and Grants Coordinator for LRMA, invited the Board to come celebrate the unveiling of new signage and exhibits on September 24.
- ACCT's Democracy's Colleges: Call to Action, approved by the Board in August, noting SPC was the first in the country to adopt this document emphasizing a national focus on student success rates. Mr. Burke stated community colleges need to move from a focus on simply offering open access to a focus on success. He shared information from education experts related to unemployment rates, factors and indicators affecting completion, and strategies to consider, and challenged the Board and staff to focus on these strategies in improving student success. He stressed the College's primary goals to this end should be increasing full-time

student enrollment and decreasing the number of students needing remediation. In addition, Mr. Burke shared a web page for Cabrillo College in California as an institutional example of "cohort-based classes and programs" and learning communities. He agreed to provide a copy of this website information to trustees. He asked that this proven initiative be considered as a policy for enhancing student success and sought further discussion on success rates of distance education students. The Board discussed aspects of the cohort-based initiatives and strategies of measuring student success. Dr. Law clarified the inclusion of degree-seeking students only in tracking student success and noted that further discussion is needed after more information is obtained at the annual ACCT conference in Toronto this October. He encouraged the focus to remain on increasing student completion. Mr. Johnston encouraged those going to the Toronto conference to address the issue of equality in measuring student success among all educational institutions. Mr. Burke suggested that a brief discussion on what the College is doing in regard student success and achievement be a permanent part of each Board agenda due to the importance of this topic.

Mr. Brett thanked Mr. Burke for his comments and commended Dr. Law's Learning Plan, which he said is very much aligned with these current challenges being discussed. He further commended Dr. Law for his leadership in reaching out to Gibbs High School during a critical time, to which the Board concurred.

In addition, Mr. Burke commented on the great operational audit, which included only insignificant findings suggesting minor improvement. The Board commended all staff involved for their efforts that result in SPC's positive audits.

Chairman Burke presented Mr. Brett and Mr. Johnston with gavel plaques in recognition of their past years of service as SPC Board of Trustees Chair.

President Law noted that an SPC/USF combined senior staff meeting has been scheduled in follow up to the meeting with USF St. Petersburg. Further, he stated he recently met with the following presidents to hatch an alliance plan for high-visibility coordination in the nurturing of articulating high school students over the next 60 to 90 days: Dr. Kathy Johnson, President, Pasco-Hernando Community College; Dr. Kenneth Atwater, President, Hillsborough Community College; and Dr. Judy Genshaft, President, University of South Florida (USF). He provided a synopsis of initiatives in the works. Mr. Burke expressed his hopes that the alliance could become even broader to include the private institutions. Dr. Law noted he had a positive meeting just this week with President Don Eastman of Eckerd College with hopes of including them in future partnerships. Additionally, he noted that Pinellas County Schools Superintendent Julie Janssen is scheduled to be at the Board's October 18 meeting for brief dialog, and Dr. Law is scheduled to appear at the October meeting of the Pinellas County School Board.

Mr. Burke inquired about the issue of building naming brought forth at the August Board meeting. Dr. Law responded he would have a preliminary report for the Board in October and more in-depth detail by November.

<u>10-232.</u> The minutes of the Special Meeting of the Board of Trustees of St. Petersburg College for August 17, 2010 were presented by the chairman for approval. Mr. Burke asked that Board comments made at that meeting in specific regard to Ms. Kim Corry, Staff Assistant to the Board, be reflected in the minutes. Comments made by the Board were in appreciation of her coordination of successful graduation ceremonies and overall Board support.

Mr. Brett moved approval of the minutes as submitted, with above comments noted. Mr. Johnston seconded the motion. Mr. Johnston voted aye; Mr. Burke voted aye; Mr. Brett voted aye; and Mrs. Bilirakis voted aye. Motion carried.

<u>10-233</u>. Under Monthly Reports, Chairman Brett requested a report of any new business from Board Attorney Lang, General Counsel Syd McKenzie, and the Provosts.

There was no report from either Mr. Lang or Mr. McKenzie. Mr. Lang noted his involvement in the acquisition of the church property adjacent to the Clearwater Campus, a matter being reported on later on the agenda. Dr. Law announced the Dec. 31, 2010 resignation of Mr. McKenzie. Trustees expressed their regret of his departure and appreciation for his years of service to SPC and extensive knowledge of the Community College System.

Under Provost Reports, Mr. J.C. Brock, Campus Executive Officer, Allstate Center, featured SPC's Emergency Management Plan website, reporting on various aspects of the Plan. He distributed the College's Emergency Response Guide to the trustees, as well as SPC's Threat Assessment brochure.

Dr. Conferlete Carney, Provost, Tarpon Springs Campus, featured a comparison of student enrollment growth for fall semesters, noting the various challenges and plans in place to address those challenges.

Dr. Jim Olliver, Provost, Seminole Campus/eCampus, featured "Student Clubs as a Complement to Learning." At Mr. Burke's request, he provided additional information on distance education class size and success rates. Mr. Burke stated the Board needs further education on improving retention rates, a topic that can be covered on future agendas as part of the report on student success and achievement.

Ms. Yvonne Ulmer, Campus Executive Officer, Downtown/Midtown Centers, presented demographics of the two sites by ethnicity. She distributed brochures featuring SPC Midtown's Student Activities and Academic Resources and its Women on the Way Resource

Center and shared ways the Downtown/Midtown staff is responding to its students. In response to Mr. Johnston, she explained the enrollment at Midtown is at a maximum for its current capacity, while Downtown still has the capacity for growth. Mr. Johnston recommended the Board support devoting more resources to addressing enrollment growth and increasing access at these sites.

In closing, Mr. Burke commented on his review of the SPC Fact Book and the need to anticipate declining enrollment if the economy improves. He asked that the Board be educated on what it means to our enrollment if historical trends hold true.

<u>10-234.</u> Under Old Business, Dr. Pat Rinard, Associate Vice President of Enrollment Management, presented the Fall Semester Enrollment Overview (formerly Item VII-J), a report the president asked be shared at the start of every semester based on opening day unduplicated headcount of credit students. Dr. Rinard shared PowerPoint presentations on the demographics of who is here for Fall 2010 overall, and who is here from the First-Time-In-College (FTIC) Cohort for Fall 2010. (A copy of the PowerPoint presentations is included as **Attachment A** – **10-234**.)

Mr. Michael Bennett, Associate Vice President, Financial Assistance Services, joined Dr. Rinard in responding to Board questions regarding financial aid. Dr. Law reported there was \$58.3 million in financial aid disbursed to students this semester. He said he plans to schedule a future discussion with the Board to address the many issues associated with financial aid. Dr. Rinard agreed to report back to Mr. Burke on the campus demographic of SPC's Hispanic students. Dr. Law noted that the College retained a high-level demographic firm to assist with the enrollment analysis. In regard to specific course enrollment, Mr. Johnston suggested future presentations show actual course names vs. course numbers in order to better assist the Board.

In addition, Dr. Law explained the exercise of following a particular FTIC cohort of 3,647 degree- or certificate-seeking students through the institution and tracking its success and then reporting back to the Board each semester as to its status and what has been learned from this group.

Chairman Burke commended staff involved in producing the Fact Book, which he noted has been a valuable resource for Board reference.

<u>10-235.</u> Under New Business, President Law presented his 90-Day Learning Plan Report, entitled "The SPC 7/24 Initiative." He distributed the published report, which was also sent electronically to the Board and is scheduled to go online following the Board meeting, and highlighted, via PowerPoint, the various focuses of his plan and projects within those focuses. At Mr. Burke's request, Dr. Law provided further explanation on Focus #3, Managing Growth, in regard to Annual Schedule Planning. He noted he plans to bring a schedule to the Board next

month that will allow faculty hiring to be ahead of the curve rather than in late summer as has been past practice. In regard to Focus #6, Core Learning Outcomes, he commended the deans for their expertise in moving each of their programs ahead. He also briefly shared his 90-day and 180-day windows and his goals for July 1, 2011.

Mr. Brett commended Dr. Law on a great document and his initiative to seek out information in advance during the presidential search. Under Focus #2, Increased Public Accountability, he inquired as to the president's plan for "expanding and invigorating" the College's commitment to retention of minorities and how the College envisions expanding into other community partnerships, particularly those with Pinellas County Schools. Dr. Law noted the primary responsibilities for retention are (1) strengthening a student's orientation upon entrance, (2) having a learning plan in place for that student to own, (3) strengthening various student initiatives and (4) identifying which students need assistance and which do not. Additionally, he explained how the Gibbs High School initiative benefits SPC in nurturing student success, and he addressed the challenge of partnering with other Pinellas County schools. Mr. Brett further encouraged Dr. Law to bring the Strategic Plan Review to the Board sooner than indicated in his 180-day window in order to bring the Board up to speed, and he sought further explanation on the delayed process for faculty hiring. Dr. Law agreed to expedite the Board's review of the Strategic Plan and responded in regard to the faculty hiring timeline as a shift in viewpoint of financial planning. He noted his plan to bring the list of new hires for the next academic year to the Board in October with a goal for all hires to be made by April. Mr. Brett additionally inquired as to the success rate for online courses. Dr. Law responded that although it is sometimes below 40 percent, his expectation is that it be the same as that of traditional courses.

Mr. Johnston commended Dr. Law for his informative report and long-term, indepth planning that will be beneficial to the Board. He expressed concern about the financial aid timeline and improving its placement in the registration process to allow for more timely notification of students.

Mr. Brett commended Dr. Law's plan for one budget, noting he would still like to see a snapshot of how each new program coming online is doing individually before it is integrated into the budget. Mr. Johnston reiterated previous comments shared regarding analyzing costs per program, including grants, in an effort to better justify offerings before moving forward. He said he wants to be sure <u>all</u> overhead costs are taken into consideration to allow the Board a better comfort level before approving. Mr. Burke expressed appreciation for the Information Summary attached to each grant, an effort that is very helpful to the Board.

Mr. Brett further commended Dr. Law for his prioritization of faculty compensation. He inquired about the exclusion of anything related to the textbook issue in the 7/24 Initiative. He asked that this remain a priority in his action plan as the new bookstore contract is being negotiated.

Mr. Burke stated he was very impressed with the integrity of the report, which showed both the good news and the bad, particularly in the area of student services and faculty

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hiring. He challenged Dr. Law to always show the true picture to the Board. He expressed excitement and appreciation in regard to the proposed annual schedule planning, and sought clarification on the often used term "competency-based testing" and how it relates to the current national student success challenges. Dr. Law responded as to the meaning of the term and what it entails. In regard to the strategic plan, Mr. Burke said he agrees with Mr. Brett that the Board has not had ownership of this document in the past. He suggested a full-day Board retreat to adequately address and understand the College's strategic plan. The Board concurred, noting that advance one-on-one meetings may be necessary with the trustees as well.

Mrs. Bilirakis commended Dr. Law on his efforts, both in this report and for his visibility throughout the College and community.

<u>10-236.</u> The Board considered Items VII-C.1a-C.1c, Applications for and Acceptance of Grants/Restricted Funds (if awarded); Item VII-C.2, Amendments to Grants/Restricted Funds Contracts; and Item VII-D.1 under Capital Outlay. Mr. Johnston moved approval. Mrs. Bilirakis seconded the motion.

Mr. Burke sought further explanation on the value of the U.S. Department of Education grant for a Center of Excellence for Veteran Student Success, Item VII-C.1b. Dr. Tonjua Williams, Vice President, Academic & Student Affairs, explained the investment being made with this grant to expand services to veteran students and the associated in-kind funding. Mr. Johnston voted aye; Mr. Burke voted aye; Mr. Brett voted aye; and Mrs. Bilirakis voted aye. Motion carried.

Authorization is sought to continue as a subcontractor whereby St. Petersburg College's Southeastern Public Safety Institute provides counterdrug training throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands as part of the National Guard's counterdrug initiative as set forth in the original statement of work and amended annually. Funding for the College's services will be provided through congressional appropriations to the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD)—earmarked to the College's Multijurisdictional Counterdrug Task Force Training (MCTFT) department – through the National Guard Bureau (NGB). The College receives funding via a cost reimbursable contract with Florida's Department of Military Affairs (DMA), Florida National Guard (FLNG). See attached Information Summary for additional information. Permission is sought to enter into the necessary contractual agreements, as appropriate, and to accept funding for this program.

The total amount of estimated appropriation for the fiscal year October 1, 2010 through September 30, 2011 is up to \$3.0 million. Of this amount, it is anticipated that approximately \$400,000 may be withheld by NGB, on the College's behalf, to pay for administration, salaries/benefits of Guard personnel assigned to the program and up to \$40,000 may be held by DMA, on the College's behalf, to pay for specific expenses associated with the program such as shipping, military vehicle maintenance, counter drug instructional textbooks and other operational expenditures related to MCTFT. Accordingly, the actual contract between the College and the Department of Military Affairs is anticipated to be up to \$2.6 million. Contract amounts may be increased or decreased depending on final appropriation amounts. Exact figures for the 2010-11 fiscal year will be presented to the Board after the U.S. Department of Defense releases final funding. Such funding will allow the College to provide personnel, facilities, equipment and supplies to operate and manage the MCTFT program. SPC also expects to recover approximately 5% of the total contract amount as indirect support.

Total Funding for 2009-10: Final funding for the 2009-10 fiscal year has been received. The total appropriation for this period, October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010, was \$5,524,101. Of this amount, \$396,363 was held by NGB, on the College's behalf, to pay for salaries/benefits of Guard personnel assigned to the program and \$100,000 was held by DMA, on the College's behalf, to pay for specific expenses associated with the program including shipping, military vehicle maintenance, counter drug instructional textbooks and other operational expenditures related to MCTFT. Accordingly, the actual contract between the College and the Department of Military Affairs for fiscal year 2009-10 was \$5,027,738.

Syd McKenzie, General Counsel; James C. Brock, Campus Executive Officer; and Eileen LaHaie, Executive Director, Center for Public Safety Innovation, recommend approval.

Some of the strategies to achieve this goal are: 1) Conducting recruitment efforts in the midtown area of St. Petersburg, an area whose population is primarily comprised of African Americans, and in Clearwater's large Hispanic community; and 2) Working with Disability Resources offices on the campuses to ensure veteran students with disabilities are aware of the services available to them. Understanding that veterans are not comfortable disclosing disabilities, especially those that are "hidden" such as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, efforts will be made by project staff to make it easy and comfortable to access disability resources and to ensure veteran students of confidentiality. Some steps that will be taken to help veterans overcome their concerns about disclosing disability are: 1) Ensure that disability resources staff visit the Centers and become familiar to the veteran students in informal ways; 2) Ask veteran students who have successfully used the services offered to encourage their peers to do the same; and 3) Relax, wherever possible, the need for extensive documentation for a veteran student to qualify for services.

The award funds will be used to pay personnel hired to support program activities. Other expenditures include travel expenses, supplies, contractual services, and other services. St. Petersburg College will provide a voluntary in-kind match of \$304,233 in personnel funds and \$109,254 in fringe benefits for a total of \$413,757.

Amendment #3 to the Educational Plant Survey dated June 19, 2007, (Spot Survey #3)

Amendment #1 to the Educational Plant Survey dated June 19, 2007 (Spot Survey #1), was approved by the Board on March 18, 2008 (see attached). This Amendment established a new site as the Veterinary Technology Center, Site Number 18, at the School Board of Pinellas County Seminole Vocational Education Center.

It has now been determined that the Veterinary Technology Center will be located at a new site on Ulmerton Road. This Amendment changes the site location from the School Board of Pinellas County Seminole Vocational Educational Center to a new property on Ulmerton Road adjacent to the Pinellas County Animal Services Buildings. Further, this property is being purchased by the St. Petersburg College Foundation (partially funded by a private donation), and the College will enter into a 40-year lease agreement with the Foundation for the property.

2401 Drew Street, Clearwater, Florida – Preliminary Approval

Approval is sought to proceed with the offer to purchase the Faith United Church of Christ property located at 2401 Drew Street, Clearwater, Florida, to perform due diligence and to enter into a purchase agreement incorporating the approved terms.

The College staff is continuing to work with Mr. Joseph Lang, Board Attorney, to prepare an offer on the church property. We have received two appraisals, one for \$1,300,000 and the other for \$1,320,000. In addition, we have a Phase I audit, asbestos survey and property survey that were completed last year when we previously considered purchasing this property. These items will need to be re-certified.

The church consists of approximately 3.82 acres with approximately 17,472 square feet of improvements (sanctuary, office, day care classroom building and a single-family structure).

At this point, we are ready to make an offer in the amount of \$1,300,000. This is with a \$5,000.00 deposit with the right to cancel if the property is found to be unsatisfactory for its intended purposes or for any other reason. We propose a 45-day due diligence period and would attempt to close on the property before the end of 2010. The agreement outlining all details will be presented to the Board for final approval.

Doug Duncan, Senior Vice President, Administrative/Business Services and Information Technology; and Susan Reiter, Vice President, Facilities Planning and Institutional Services, recommend approval.

<u>10-239.</u> President Law briefly reported on the former Juvenile Welfare Board (JWB) property just south of the College's Health Education Center (HEC), a 50,000 sq. ft. facility with 209 parking spaces that is being preliminarily considered for possible expansion of HEC. **SUBJECT:** Renewal of College's Stop Loss Policy

Approval is sought to renew the College's stop-loss policy for its self-funded health plan effective October 1, 2010, according to the agreed-upon terms. The College carries stop-loss coverage on specific (individual person) as well as overall aggregate (college-wide) claims to reduce its risk of catastrophic loss. The recommendation includes adjustment to coverage levels based on low claim levels in recent years. The College will re-evaluate the coverage levels as part of an overall review of the plan coverage leading into the 2011-12 plan year.

The College's policy would continue with Symetra Financial. The Symetra Financial aggregate and specific stop-loss premium is \$282,300, which represents a decrease of 37.1% from the previous year. The terms of the agreement are as follows:

6Hx23-4.69 REQUIREMENTS OF THE NURSING PROGRAM

I. Progression Requirements:

Students who are eligible to start the first specialty course in the program must submit a Health Programs Application form to be enrolled in that course. Enrolling in the first specialty course, students must continue to meet progression requirements. Students to be admitted will be determined by the Health Programs Special Rules, 6Hx23-4.53, Section I. D.

- A. Minimum requirements for registration into the first specialty course are as follows:
  - 1. Completion of all college preparatory course work.
  - Standard (Scaled Score) of 95 on the reading subsection of the Florida College Entry Level Placement Test, equivalent score on other standardized tests as recommended by the nursing faculty and approved by President's Cabinet, or have a Master's degree or higher from a regionally accredited university or college, or earn "C" or better in REA 1105.
  - 3. Candidates who have had previous courses in another registered nursing program must submit a transcript from the school of nursing and a reference from the official head of the program or appropriate designate. An "individual learning plan" will be developed for each transferring in student by the SPC Nursing faculty that delineates the completion of the nursing program in order to graduate from SPC.
  - 4. Completion of a minimum of 11 credits in Nursing preentry general education and support courses with a 2.75 minimum grade point average on a 4.00 scale and a 2.75 minimum grade point average on a 4.00 scale in the following courses that are being considered for admission: BSC 2085, BSC 2085L, BSC 2086, BSC 2086L, MCB 2010, and MCB 2010L.
  - 5. Computer/Information Literacy Competency (no minimum credit hours required). Computer/Information

literacy competency may be demonstrated by completing one of the following:

- a. Passing a College approved Basic Computer/Information Skills Competency Test: or
- b. Successful completion of at least one of the following:
  - 1) CTS 1101 Basic Computer and Information Literacy.
  - 2) CGS 1100 Microcomputer Applications (as revised in 2002) or LIS 1102, CGS 1510 and OST 1741.
  - 3) EME 2040 Introduction to Educational Technology (as revised in 2002), preferred for Education majors.
- B. All pre-entry, general education and support courses must be completed with a minimum grade of "C".
- C. Each student selected must have a physical examination and required immunizations, titers and/or screenings prior to entrance into the first year of the Nursing Program. These must be updated as required while in the program.
- D. All progression requirements for health related programs (6Hx23-4.53) apply to the Nursing Program.
- E. Students must complete the pre-entry science and support course requirements within three attempts.
- F. Consideration for readmission into the nursing program after having failed or withdrawn from any course in the first session of the Nursing Program will require the student to go through the selective admission process.
- G. Students transferring from another Nursing program must be in good standing in such program.

- H. Students must have a valid <u>American Heart Association</u> Health Care Provider CPR Certification prior to entrance into the first year of the Nursing Program. The certification must be kept current throughout the program.
- II. For the transitional program for practical nurses licensed in Florida, a course is specially designed as entry point for licensed practical nurses or other special students. Special students are defined as students who have satisfactorily completed course work deemed to be equivalent to that of an LPN. Students who successfully complete NUR 1001C, Orientation to Technical Nursing Therapy, Clinical Experience and NUR 1001, Orientation to Technical Nursing Therapy, will enter the sophomore class.
  - A. Minimum requirements for consideration of licensed practical nurses and special students are the same as I.A., B., C., D., E., F., G. & H. above and in addition:
    - 1. Be currently licensed in Florida (or eligible for license by transfer of license from out of state).
    - 2. Completion of the following courses with grades as defined in I.A.:

PSY 1012 -- General Psychology

BSC 2085/2085L -- Human Anatomy and Physiology and Laboratory I

BSC 2086/2086L -- Human Anatomy and Physiology and Laboratory II

3. Additional pre-entry course requirements include:

College approved Humanities elective (Applicants who have earned an Associate in Arts, Baccalaureate, or higher degree from an accredited institution are waived from this requirement.)

4. For those LPN transitional students entering in May (day schedule), it is recommended they have most, if not all, general education and support courses completed.

- III. For the transitional program for paramedics (evening track), the following are the minimum requirements for consideration as an applicant to the freshman class:
  - A. As outlined in I.A., B., C., D., E., F., G. & H. above.
  - B. Additional requirements:
    - Must have completed 25 pre-entry, general education or support credits. These MUST include 8 hours of anatomy and physiology, 3 hours of English, and 3 hours of PSY 1012. The other 11 hours are the student's choice from required pre-entry, general education and support curriculum.
    - Must have received an AS in Emergency Medical Services or have taken equivalent general education/ support courses.
    - 3. Must be currently a state certified paramedic.
- IV. Students who have any combination of two failures in the following nursing courses listed below will be dismissed and unable to return to the program:

Nursing I Theory/Clinical NUR 1021C; Nursing II Theory/Clinical NUR 1211C; Nursing III Theory/Clinical NUR 2462C; Nursing IV Theory/Clinical NUR 2731C; Transition to Professional Nursing NUR 1001C; and Nursing Care Management NUR 2811C.

- V. Classes may be offered during the day or evening schedule depending upon the availability of classes within the program. Evening is defined as 1:00 p.m. - 11:00 p.m.
- VI. In addition to SPC graduation requirements, students must meet these special graduation requirements:
  - A. A grade of "C" or better in each of the designated specialty courses in this program.

- B. A grade of "C" or better in all courses in the Nursing Program.

#### 6Hx23-6.9017 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY COMPUTER SECURITY POLICY

I. Purpose & Intent

This policy is intended to establish minimum IT security standards for workstations, portable computers and personal data assistants (PDA's) that reside inside of St. Petersburg College's Internet firewall.

# II. Compliance Requirements

All users shall be required to attend security training in order to understand the protections that each computer system automatically applies, the basic protective measures that are maintained by campus support technicians (TRSs) or information systems, and their role in ensuring compliance.

#### A. Identification Information

The management or designee of each College campus, site or department must work with Information Systems or Property

Records, as the case may be, to maintain up to date records identifying the user or user group utilizing a given College owned computer system.

# B. Computer Security

- 1. All computers shall be configured to have a password-enabled screen saver. This security lockout feature shall automatically initiate after the computer remains idle from user interaction after a predefined time period. A user must then reenter their password to gain access to the computer. Exceptions may be granted for special purpose systems (Kiosk, etc.) whose operation may be adversely impacted while running a screen saver. Where possible, technical resource staff shall initially configure these settings. The user is responsible for ensuring that the feature remains enabled.
- 2. All workstations, portable computers, and PDA's must be updated with the latest security patches, virus scanning software and virus data files (where applicable). Patches for high-risk vulnerabilities shall be installed within 24 hours of notification. Where possible, technical resource staff shall configure automatic security updates. The user is responsible for ensuring that the patching remains current.
- 3. All software installed on College computers must be College owned or licensed through the College. Exceptions to the above restriction must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the Administrative Information Systems (AIS) software license administrator. Technical resource staff performing initial software installation shall verify proper licensing. The user is responsible for ensuring that any software installed by the user is in accordance with this Rule.
- 4. Installation, introduction or connection of administration domains (forests, NT4 domains, or workgroups) to College networks is prohibited, unless prior approval is obtained from the College's director of Network Systems. In the absence

of the director of Network Systems, the <u>associate</u> vice president of Information Systems may authorize such access.

- 5. All PDA's used to connect directly to College computers must be College owned. Exceptions to this must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the College's director of Network Systems.
- 6. Computers shall not have software or services installed that could interfere with traditional network services or routing services (e.g.: Dynamic Routing Protocols, DHCP, BootP, PxE, RARP...).
- 7. The use of remote access technology or remote file sharing mechanisms which grant access to College computers from outside the College firewalls (e.g.: PC-Anywhere, GotoMyPC, VNC, NetMeeting, Remote Desktop, SSH, Telnet server, FTP server, IRC...) is strictly prohibited without the written permission of the College's director of Network Systems.
- 8. Workstations, portable computers, and PDA's should be reasonably secured.

# C. Computer Data Security

- Personal and sensitive information, including, but not limited to, names, addresses, and SSNs should only be downloaded to perform duties outlined in the employee's position description.
- 2. Effective in 2008-09, new laptop computers assigned to employees whose job duties require storage of personal and sensitive information shall use encryption technology to protect such sensitive information in the event of loss or theft of the laptop. Exceptions to this must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the College's associate vice president of Information Systems.

- All storage media must be completely overwritten with random information prior to disposal or transfer to another entity (including hard disks, tape media, floppy disks, and any other writable media). If media cannot be overwritten, media shall be destroyed.
- 4. <u>Server based systems are to be used whenever possible for storage, transmission or processing of sensitive data.</u>
- 5. Portable storage devices such as hard drives, DVDs, CDs and USB flash drives may not be used to store student or employee personal or sensitive information from any College-owned database. Exceptions to this must be documented and approved by the department supervisor to whom the employee reports after consultation with the College's associate vice president of Information Systems.
- 6. <u>Portable devices used to store College data must make use</u> of encryption technology to fully secure the data.
- III. Enforcement and Consequences

Violation of this policy may result in the revocation of access to St. Petersburg College information technology resources.







# Points of Interest from Financial Reports for June 30, 2010:

Net Assets or Fund Balance for the entire College increased by \$10 million.

The Unrestricted Fund balance (Fund 10, 14 & 16) increased \$3.6 million due to increased enrollments, tuition rates and the addition of the technology fee. State funding decreased but was largely offset by the stimulus stabilization funding shown as Federal Support or Other Revenue. Expenses included a \$5 million transfer to the Unexpended Plant Fund to cover construction costs incurred. Personnel expenses increased, attributable to adjunct faculty growth in support of the enrollment increase as well as increasing costs for benefits across all personnel groups.

The Baccalaureate Fund balance (Fund 12 & 17) increased \$1.6 million primarily due to program and enrollment growth. State funding decreased but largely offset by the stimulus stabilization funding shown as Federal Support or Other Revenue. Personnel expenses increased for both full-time and adjunct faculty in support of the program and enrollment growth.

The Auxiliary Fund balance (Fund 30) increased \$0.6 million as more funds were transferred to other funds to be spent on student recruitment and student services.

The Scholarship/Short-term Loan Fund balance (Funds 40 & 50) decreased \$0.7 million primarily due to the \$0.9 million Short-term Loan Program shifting to the NelNet Payment Plan Program in the Spring term of 2009-2010. The short-term loan funds were transferred back to the Unrestricted Current Fund. The affect of that transfer was partially offset by increased Federal grants revenues and student financial aid fees.

The Unexpended Plant Fund balance (Fund70) increased \$4.3 million driven by the \$5 million transfer in from the Unrestricted Current fund to cover constructions costs previously incurred with no future funding available.

The Debt Service and Investment in Plant Fund balance (Fund 80 & 90) increased \$0.08 million driven by the net effect of capitalized asset additions offset by depreciation expense.

and the Job Corps Program

Recently the City of St. Petersburg resolved some legal matters that cleared the way for the opening of the Job Corps Center in the Midtown Community. These Centers are operated by private companies under the purview of the U.S. Department of Labor.

The Job Corps Centers provide entry-level training in a large number of occupational areas. In addition, the Job Corps Center will provide GED training as a component of their educational offerings.

Most of the students in the Job Corps programs are focused on successful completion of their training and entry into productive employment. For some students, the possibility of going beyond the Job Corps training is in their goals. Toward that end, it is helpful for the College to have an established relationship with the Job Corps Center, focused on assisting students to move into courses and programs at the College. The attached Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between our two organizations is intended to document that emerging relationship.

St. Petersburg College (SPC), and Cornerstone Solutions Inc. (CSI), a U. S. Department of Labor Job Corps Service Contractor, recognize the need for a cooperative service relationship between their respective organizations. Therefore, by this formal Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), each agrees to enter into such a cooperative service Partnership on or about November 1, 2010.

The mission of St. Petersburg College "is to provide accessible, affordable, high-quality education by keeping the learner's needs at the center of decision-making and working in partnership with its dynamic, multi-cultural community." The mission of Cornerstone Solutions Inc. is to deliver solutions, programs, and services that add value and demonstrably beneficial outcomes to customers, constituents, and the community, while maintaining our uncompromising core values in everything we do." Job Corps is "a **free** education and training program that helps young people learn a career, earn a high school diploma or GED, and find and keep a good job. For eligible youth at least 16 years of age, Job Corps provides the all-around skills needed to

succeed in a career and in life." These philosophies form the foundation for a sound partnership to facilitate the transition of eligible Job Corps students to St. Petersburg College.

Job Corps students who have successfully earned a high school diploma or GED will have the opportunity to seek matriculation into SPC's Associate and Bachelor Degree programs; SPC's credit certificate programs, as well as the GED Preparation and testing program (Adult Education).

Through this partnership, Job Corps graduates meeting St. Petersburg College's admission requirements will enroll in appropriate higher education courses (as determined by placement scores) consistent with their Career Ladder and Career Pathways, subject to the fee structure at SPC.

# St. Petersburg College Agrees to:

- ➤ Provide college awareness information sessions to Job Corps students, including workshops that focus on federal and state financial aid opportunities and scholarships. These sessions will take place on-site at the Pinellas Job Corps Center as well as via educational field trips to SPC for local Job Corps students.
- ➤ Provide transition services to Job Corps students, including pre-admissions counseling, placement testing, academic and career advisement, consistent with the student's specified Career Pathway.
- ➤ Provide to Job Corps students the full complement of SPC course offerings, depending on a student's admissions eligibility and placement, to include continuing education programming, and Adult Education and GED preparation programs.
- ➤ Provide a campus liaison/advisor at each of the SPC (9) campuses that is designated to handle admission and enrollment processes of Job Corps students.
- > Provide to CSI/Job Corps verification of students' matriculation at SPC.

# Cornerstone Solutions, Inc. on behalf of Job Corps Agrees to:

- ➤ Develop and maintain a solid, cooperative working relationship with representatives of SPC to facilitate the promotion of SPC's educational offerings, academic and student support services to Job Corps students.
- > Provide preliminary eligibility screening of Job Corps students and refer them to SPC accordingly prior to students separation.
- ➤ Host SPC personnel on-site at Job Corps Centers to conduct presentations and workshops, relative to the institution's comprehensive programs of study and services.

- ➤ Establish center liaisons at feeder centers to process the admission and enrollment process of Job Corps Students matriculating to SPC.
- Assist SPC bound Job Corps students with the completion of the SPC Admissions Application, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and the gathering of required documentation to supplement both applications.
- ➤ Inform and assist Job Corps students with all financial/tuition requirements

#### **MOU Standard Terms and Conditions:**

- 1. Neither party shall use the other party's name, trademarks or logos without the express written consent of that party.
- 2. As a political subdivision of the State of Florida, all provisions herein, shall at all times be subject to any and all Florida laws, Florida regulations and the District Board of Trustees Rules which are applicable to St. Petersburg College's operations, commitments and/or activities in furtherance of any terms specified herein.
- 3. During the term of this MOU, neither party shall discriminate against any person on the basis of race, color, religion, gender, national or ethnic origin, disability or veteran or marital status.
- 4. Nothing contained in this MOU shall grant, imply, or intend that either party shall have any right or authority to create any obligation or responsibility, express or implied, on behalf of or in the name of the other party, or to bind the other party contractually in any manner whatsoever absent the other party's joinder in writing.
- 5. Notice shall be effective if delivered by U.S. Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested, or by recognized overnight courier delivery to the respective Administrators identified by each party.
- 6. Either party may terminate this MOU without cause at any time upon sixty (60) days advance written notice provided, however, that all work and services rendered up to the effective date of termination shall be fully paid at the time thereof.
- 7. Any amendment or modification of this MOU must be in writing and signed by an authorized representative of the parties.
- 8. Each party and the person signing this MOU represents and warrants that they are authorized to sign this MOU on behalf of their respective organization as the act and deed

<u>10-245.</u> Under the President's Report, Dr. Law discussed the following:

Athletics Update – He noted a change in the coaching of SPC's baseball team due to unfortunate circumstances and stated he would be bringing the name of a very good candidate to replace Coach Pano. He informed the Board that staff has uncovered a series of events resulting from poor judgments in the baseball program that will possibly result in sanctions restricted to baseball, though the full extent of the issue is still being confirmed. **SUBJECT:** Proposed SPC Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions (Working Title)

Attached is the latest draft of the program abstract for the proposed SPC Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions (working title). Recall that we have been working on this initiative (previously generically called the "Government Institute") for several years. In 2007 the Florida Legislature allocated \$7.5 million to support the creation of the institute, honoring Congressman C. W. Bill Young.

The lynchpin and first activity of the Institute – the baccalaureate program in Public Policy and Administration – launched this fall term, and the oil crisis in the Gulf provided the College (and fledgling institute) an opportunity to engage the public in a serious discussion on responses to the crisis and pathways to a more comprehensive energy policy for Florida.

With the start of the baccalaureate program and forum series, and encouragement from Congressman Young's office, the College seeks to move forward with the formal designation and program plan for the Institute. This abstract ties the Institute's mission squarely with the mission of the College, with a clear focus on world-class academic programs, civic engagement and community outreach which have always been the hallmarks of SPC. We are particularly excited about ways the Institute will engage our students, and those in Pinellas K-12 institutions, in understanding and involvement in all levels of government.

We seek the Board's feedback at this time, and propose to return with a full program plan at the October Board meeting. The legislative support provided will fund the Institute requiring no subsidization from the College's operating budget.

# The SPC Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions (working title): Vision, Mission and Proposed Program

A multi-faceted policy center committed to: offering high-quality programs and activities that address real-world problems in a systematic, strategic way; providing leadership to address the needs of the communities served by St. Petersburg College, and preparing students for careers in public policy and administration in a global marketplace.

#### **Proposed Mission Statement**

"The Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions at St. Petersburg College is dedicated to advancing academic excellence, community engagement, economic vitality and public understanding through high-quality, solutions-directed public policy programs. Its purpose is to enrich the educational experience, engage with government at all levels to promote unity and efficiency, facilitate economic activity and involve citizens in their college and government."

# **Recommended Activities and Programs**

Five broad areas of focus from which a variety of policy programs can be built:

- 1. Academic Enrichment: A primary focus of the institute should be to support existing academic programs to enhance the educational experience, with special emphasis on the Public Policy and Administration baccalaureate program. But there are opportunities in other disciplines as well, including Environmental Studies, Consular Training, Public Safety Administration, Ed Studies, Sustainability, Business Administration and International Business. Some activities for immediate focus:
  - Develop student internships in Pinellas, the Tampa Bay region, Tallahassee and Washington.
  - Develop shadowing opportunities with officials from cities, counties and colleges.
  - Assist the Dean and faculty in facilitating articulation of SPC Public Policy and Administration graduates into Master's studies in USF Master of Public Administration program.
  - Assist St. Petersburg College in facilitating planned new programs in Diplomatic Protocols with State Department and Non-Government Organizations, Military Language

Training with Central Command at MacDill AFB, and Foster Care Training with the Department of Children and Families.

- Develop student exchange programs with foreign colleges and organizations in conjunction with the Center for International Programs.
- Provide research opportunities with Congressman Young's archives.
- Offer seminars with guest lectures by public leaders on key policy issues. Require a significant student paper to develop critical thinking as well as professional writing skills.
- Make attendance at institute's public forums part of course credit when relevant (faculty decision), with an option for "global awareness points" in the transcript again in conjunction with the Center for International Programs.
- Work with the Deans, faculty and students in creating curriculum for and staging Model Congress and Model UN.
- Work with the Graham, Frey and USF-St. Petersburg Institutes to promote civic education.
- **2. Civic Engagement**: In addition to the State and National Connections noted later in this abstract, a primary focus of the Institute is to work with all 24 local government jurisdictions in Pinellas County to improve communications, efficiency and collaboration. Secondary: Advance the level of professionalism among local elected officials. Third: Increase citizen involvement in their government, from informed voting to attending government meetings to filing for public office. To put these goals into action:
  - Become a center for assisting and mediating relationships with all 24 separate
    government units in Pinellas County, and the Tampa Bay region where appropriate.
    Approach it from an efficiency basis: how can the governments work together to improve
    service, cut costs and work across jurisdictional lines for infrastructure, disaster
    response, emergency services and transportation. Make use of the EpiCenter's
    Collaborative Labs and staff for staging and facilitation.
  - Provide leadership training for local government officials, from basic instruction for newly elected officials to management training for mid-level supervisors to executive training for division directors and CEOs.
  - Invite Florida League of Cities to stage Elected Officials Institute workshops on campus in partnership with the institute.
  - Stage a "Candidate College" each election season to instruct those considering running for public office in the basics of conducting a campaign.
  - Sponsor candidate debates during election season and forums on Constitutional Amendments.
  - Offer classes on citizenship for community members.

- Collaborate with other policy institutes when appropriate, especially Florida Centers and Institutes with similar missions, to stage joint programs such as candidate debates and the "Candidate College."
- **3. Public Discourse**: Become a center for discussion of key policy issues and initiator of discourse on topical issues that are difficult to resolve. Leading recommendations:
  - Stage regular public forums on issues of great immediate concern, such as the current three-part series tied in to the Gulf oil spill.
  - Lead the public debate on chronic local and regional issues, such as locating the future new Rays stadium, the future of light rail, water use and conservation or health care concerns. Assemble teams from faculty and outside experts to develop consensus and invite stakeholders to seminars at the EpiCenter Collaborative Labs.
  - Engage students in relevant degree programs such as Business Administration, Public Policy, etc., to conduct surveys on local issues and offer findings to local news media and public officials.
  - Offer classes on citizenship and civic engagement for the public.
- **4. Economic Vitality**: Identify a key economic activity that best fits with the College's programs and focus on becoming a center of excellence for that. The most often cited area is sustainable practices, from renewable energy to green building standards to enabling business development, with Pinellas as primary focus and Tampa Bay region secondary. Action steps:
  - Specialize in renewable, sustainable economic activities to become a center for clean energy policy. Work with the A.S. and B.S. faculty to create this synergistic connection between the college and EDCs in Pinellas.
  - Identify business clusters in our immediate community and throughout Pinellas County and Tampa Bay. Bring together elements within those clusters to strategize on expanding ability of the clusters to access Small Business Administration loans. Cluster examples: health-care providers, assisted-living facilities, retail, and real estate/construction. Hold workshop(s) at EpiCenter.
  - Partner with Seminole Economic Development Commission in its strategic plan for economic development called SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats). Open EpiCenter Collaborative Labs for strategic planning sessions facilitated by appropriate Business faculty.
  - Work with organizations like Enterprise Florida and Workforce to support analysis and discussion of local and statewide economic development and budget issues.

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- **5. State and National Connection**: With the statewide support for this Institute and the involvement of Congressman Young in the initial visioning, this focal point has the most potential to put the institute and St. Petersburg College in the national spotlight. This key part of the Congressman and state leaders' vision was reinforced by a number of stakeholders interviewed. Among opportunities:
  - Draw on the Congressman's vast experience and network in Washington to facilitate programs and draw speakers from the national arena. Create an annual dinner event featuring national-level speaker on a topical issue. Make this a revenue-generating event.
  - Separately, or in conjunction with above, develop an annual "flagship" workshop named for Congressman Young and focused on significant national issues with prominent speakers as headliners, again calling on Mr. Young and staff to help recruit world-class thinkers and leaders to campus. Topic examples: Veteran's affairs as Iraq/Afghanistan wars wind down; national health care plan; new anti-terrorism tactics; coping with climate change; the national debt crisis. This workshop has the triple effect of enriching students' academic experience, raising awareness of SPC, and generating economic activity for the Pinellas hospitality industry.
  - Partner with Rep. Young (and staff) to arrange internships and/or visits to Congress.
  - Hone student research skills working with Congressman Young's archives.
  - Stage a Model Congress curriculum for public high school students similar to the Enterprise Village program that teaches middle school students economic principles by role-playing in model main-street settings. Public Policy program students assist.
  - Work with the Vice-President for Academic and Student Affairs, Center for International Studies and the Dean of the Public Policy program to create a Model UN especially to engage Public Policy and Administration students and A.A. and baccalaureate students in their global awareness components.
  - Seek alliance with appropriate state and national "think tanks" and associations that share key elements of the Institute's mission and support proposed activities, e.g., Association of Centers for the Study of Congress ( <a href="http://www.congresscenters.org/">http://www.congresscenters.org/</a>).

# **Summary**

The policy institute has the potential to be one of St. Petersburg College's strongest components, a public face of the college that emphasizes scholarship, leadership, community involvement and entrepreneurial expertise. The plan outlined above is conservative but ambitious, and can be structurally phased to start small but able to expand rapidly once well under way.

The plan is intended to be a road map for the institute's launch and initial programs, as well as a blueprint for long-term sustainability. But it is not cast in stone. As with any map, the user can

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choose a different road if he knows a closer route – or if the route is blocked. New college priorities, changing events in the state, nation or world, or new financial imperatives, may dictate a change of focus. It is important that the institute remain nimble enough to respond to change in a timely and strategic way.
