<u>11-024</u>. The meeting was convened by the chairman at 8:30 a.m. Mr. Burke highlighted recent world and local news and acknowledged the passing of Mr. JC Brock's father. Following a moment of silence, the invocation was given by Mr. Gibbons and was immediately followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

<u>11-025</u>. Dr. Stan Vittetoe, Provost of the Clearwater Campus and Vice President for Workforce & Continuing Education, welcomed the trustees to the Campus, expressed appreciation to his staff, and briefed the Board on some current renovations underway.

<u>11-026</u>. Dr. Law recommended adoption of a retirement resolution for Ms. Alice L. Deluca, Staff Assistant, Facilities Services, Tarpon Springs Campus. Ms. Deluca was in attendance and, joined by family and colleagues, received her resolution as presented by Chairman Burke and President Law. Mr. Johnston moved to adopt the resolution. Mr. Gibbons

seconded the motion. Mr. Gibbons voted aye; Mr. Johnston voted aye; Mr. Burke voted aye; Mr. Brett voted aye; and Mrs. Bilirakis voted aye. Motion carried.

<u>11-027</u>. Dr. Law called upon Dr. Conferlete Carney, Provost of the Tarpon Springs Campus, who introduced Ms. Victoria Cooke, the new director of the Leepa-Rattner Museum of Art, and shared highlights of her background and experience. Ms. Cooke expressed appreciation for the opportunity to join the SPC family.

<u>11-028.</u> Chairman Burke next addressed Item VI, Gibbs High School (GHS) Project Update, while Gibbs Principal Kevin Gordon was in attendance. Dr. Law introduced Principal Gordon and shared a brief overview of the relationship SPC has formed with he and the high school. Mr. Watson Haynes, Project Coordinator, Education & Student Services, and Ms. Wilma Norton, Assistant Director of Marketing & Public Information, introduced videos highlighting the partnership initiative. In addition, Mr. Haynes distributed an updated "Road to Success" report detailing aspects of the partnership, which is included as **Attachment A** – <u>**11-028**</u>, as well as an SPC/GHS lanyard.

Principal Gordon expressed appreciation for the SPC partnership and its anticipated continued success for the students. Dr. Jeff Cesta, Director of Dual Enrollment/Early College/Early Admissions, echoed Principal Gordon's comments and noted that over 150 Gibbs students are currently enrolled in dual-credit courses, and he hopes to replicate this in other parts of the County as well. Mr. Haynes reported SPC has had 53 employees involved in the Gibbs project, and Pinellas County Schools (PCS) has had 22. He noted the school has gone from a "F" grade to 6 points away from a "B" and affirmed SPC would stay with Gibbs until an "A" grade is achieved. He shared his excitement for other planned initiatives and thanked everyone involved for their support, which he said speaks well of SPC and its commitment. He offered the Board opportunity for questions.

Chairman Burke thanked Mr. Gordon, highlighting the legacy SPC has with Gibbs due to the late Cecil Keene being a former principal and SPC trustee. Mr. Johnston inquired as to the involvement of the College's Women on the Way (WOW) or Men Achieving Excellence (MAX) students. Mr. Haynes pointed out that the report distributed to the trustees reflects the involvement of the MAX students, although there has been no involvement thus far with WOW.

Mrs. Bilirakis stated she was very impressed with the project and congratulated Dr. Law for the idea, hoping it will become a model for others nationwide. Mr. Brett expressed that PCS is very fortunate to have Principal Gordon and his leadership. He inquired of Mr. Haynes as to a short-list of other schools, to which Mr. Haynes chose to not specify at this early stage. Mr. Gibbons thanked those involved in the presentation and reiterated his desire for a focus on Midtown. He commented that the Gibbs success story is changing lives every day in Midtown and reminded Mr. Haynes to diligently document what worked and what did not on this project so the College can use Gibbs as a blueprint in moving forward with other school partnerships. Mr. Gibbons suggested that SPC Midtown possibly host summer classes for PCS students, which is in keeping with the College's mission to guide all young people. On behalf of

the other trustees, he offered 100 percent support to move forward in partnership with Pinellas County Schools, but said he wants Gibbs to consistently be an "A" school before moving on to something else.

Dr. Law shared he recently met with Senator Steve Wise, Chair of the Senate Education Committee, in a private meeting in Tallahassee whereby he was asked to share an outline of the Gibbs partnership project. He said he intends to fully document the project and to move forward with college placement testing at two or three other high schools for Fall 2011 for early determination of college readiness. Mr. Burke suggested the Gates Foundation visit SPC to see this initiative first-hand. Mr. Haynes noted that Ms. Deborah Boyle, the president's Chief of Staff, has all communications from the beginning in regard to the Gibbs partnership.

In closing, Chairman Burke commended Principal Gordon for his successful Fine Arts program, which he continues to keep going in addition to all other efforts underway at Gibbs, and the pride it brings to this County. Principal Gordon recognized the winning record of the Gibbs basketball team and invited all to celebrate the team as they head toward the state finals.

<u>11-029.</u> Opportunity was given for comments from the Board Chair, Board Members and the President.

Chairman Burke sought Board comments on the many trustee activities over the past month, including (1) attendance at Dr. Law's appearance before the Tiger Bay Club; (2) attendance at the St. Petersburg Chamber of Commerce luncheon with the Governor; (3) attendance at Dr. Law's appearance before the Leadership St. Pete Alumni Association; (4) the trustees' trip, along with Dr. Law, to Tallahassee to lobby state legislators and meet with key education leaders; (5) the trustees' trip, along with Dr. Law, to the National Legislative Summit in Washington, DC including meetings with Congressmen and a U.S. Senator; (6) Chairman Burke's appearance before the Distance Learning Conference on St. Pete Beach; (7) attendance of Mr. Gibbons at the Mac J. Williams Awards Ceremony at the Seminole Campus; (7) Attendance of Mr. Gibbons and Mr. Brett at an SPC basketball game; and (8) involvement of Mr. Johnston in the Foundation Board's continued search for a new director.

Mr. Gibbons reported on the great job Dr. Law did at Tiger Bay. Mr. Burke noted he heard wonderful comments regarding Dr. Law's speech. Mr. Johnston added that two faculty who attended gave Dr. Law an A+. Mr. Lang was in attendance as well.

Mr. Burke noted the Board had a presence at the Chamber luncheon with the attendance of him and Mr. Brett.

Mr. Johnston said the Tallahassee trip included a full day of meetings with legislators. Mr. Burke added the trip was incredibly well-planned by SPC's Government Relations Director Ed Woodruff and included meetings with Senate President Mike Haridopolos, Sen. Steve Oelrich, Rep. Bill Proctor, Sen. Evelyn Lynn, Rep. Marlene O'Toole, the Governor's Chief of Staff and Deputy Chief of Staff Carrie O'Rourke, and a majority of the Pinellas Legislative Delegation. He shared highlights of each and said all meetings were very meaningful. Dr. Law added there remains a significant undercurrent on the governance and approval process of baccalaureate education and, although difficult to understand its layers, all

understood SPC and were highly respectful of the work done here. He agreed with the chairman that much work is still to be done and another visit to Tallahassee may be required. Mr. Burke expressed appreciation to Dr. Tom Furlong, Policy Consultant, for being the point person on baccalaureate education for SPC, noting also the efforts of former president Carl Kuttler. He suggested calendaring another trustee trip to Tallahassee during the legislative session, possibly with Dr. Furlong along for assistance, and that key appointments be scheduled.

Mr. Burke reported on the Washington, DC trip. He said former Congressman Mike Bilirakis was the key speaker at one of the ACCT sessions and was very effective. Mrs. Bilirakis said the trip was very productive, the trustees well-accepted, and the College wellknown. Mr. Johnston gave credit to the Bilirakis' for the trip's productivity. Mr. Burke added that trustees met with Sen. Marco Rubio's Chief of Staff and Education Director, whereby they were able to express concerns on federal issues, particularly Pell grants and Trade Adjustment Act (TAA) grants. He said Congressman Young's staff later met with Mr. Johnston and Mr. JC Brock, Campus Executive Officer of the Allstate Center. He noted that meetings were also very successful with Rep. Kathy Castor's Chief of Staff, as well as with Congressman Gus Bilirakis, who has been asked by ACCT and AACC to participate in the Congressional Community College Caucus as one of 160 congressmen and to serve as one of its two co-chairs. He added that the conference sessions were very beneficial, particularly the sessions featuring the U.S. Secretary of Labor and Dr. Jill Biden as the keynote speakers. In closing, he noted that the quality of the speakers says much about the quality of the conference, and the high attendance sends a message that community colleges are very well respected. Mr. Gibbons added that, in their legislative meetings, trustees tried to focus on the importance of Pell grant funding for our students due to pending discussions about these funds being cut.

Mr. Johnston reported that the Foundation Director Selection Committee had a very good meeting this past Friday with each of the final four candidates, and findings were to be presented to Dr. Law today. He further noted that the Textbook Committee meeting recently took place, although he was unable to attend, and a Daytona State College representative was scheduled to share his expertise regarding the future of textbooks. Ms. Yvonne Ulmer, Campus Executive Officer of the Downtown Center, reported that the meeting was excellent, with Dr. Doug Duncan, Senior Vice President of Administrative/Business Services & Information Technology, having coordinated the attendance of the Daytona representative.

Mr. Brett reported on the Leadership St. Pete Alumni event, where Dr. Law spoke, stating that the president's public speaking is something that makes the Board proud and should make all of the staff proud. He said the Palladium has formed an advisory board consisting of a cross-section of about 25 Tampa Bay people who will focus on raising the venue's level of exposure. He said he attended an orientation luncheon and commended Ms. Ulmer, Ms. Susan Reiter, Vice President of Facilities Planning & Institutional Services, and the Palladium team of Ms. Kathy Oathout and Mr. Paul Wilborn for their extensive programming, some of which he has been able to personally take advantage of.

Mr. Brett and Mr. Gibbons further reported on their attendance at the SPC women's basketball game, commenting on the amazing players, the toughness of the team, and the very well-respected new head coach.

Mr. Gibbons reported on his attendance at the Dr. Mac J. Williams, Sr. Salute to Academic Excellence Awards Ceremony at the Seminole Campus. He said the speaker, Mr. Watson Haynes, inspired the young people to do well, and it was a great event with about four different high schools represented. He reiterated the need to inspire students to continue their success in the classroom.

Mr. Burke reported on his involvement at the national Distance Learning Conference held this past weekend at the Tradewinds Resort on St. Pete Beach. He commended SPC leadership for bringing the Conference to this area. He said all who attended were favorably impressed, and he specifically commended Ms. Lynda Womer, Seminole Campus Associate Provost, who serves on the organization's national Board of Directors, and Dr. Jim Olliver, Seminole Campus Provost, who participated in and won a distance learning-related debate. He expressed appreciation to administrators who are involved in these types of activities for the tribute it pays to this College.

<u>11-030</u>. The minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of St. Petersburg College for January 18, 2011 were presented by the chairman for approval. Mr. Johnston moved approval of the minutes as submitted. Mr. Brett seconded the motion. Mr. Gibbons voted aye; Mr. Johnston voted aye; Mr. Burke voted aye; Mr. Brett voted aye; and Mrs. Bilirakis voted aye. Motion carried.

<u>11-031.</u> Under Monthly Reports, Chairman Burke requested a report of any new business from Board Attorney Lang or Acting General Counsel Suzanne Gardner.

Mr. Lang reported on the two acquisition projects, which he said are progressing positively. He noted the church property adjacent to the Clearwater Campus turned up a fuel oil tank with minimal contamination, and he is hopeful the Department of Environmental Protection will simply ask for monitoring and allow closing within 60 to 90 days. In regard to the Juvenile Welfare Board (JWB) property near the Health Education Center, he report that all processes are going very smoothly, and he felt the Board should approve the contract when considered later in the Agenda.

Ms. Gardner stated she had no report.

<u>11-032</u>. Chairman Burke called upon designated provosts and the Faculty Senate chair to share their monthly report.

Dr. Phil Nicotera, Provost of the Health Education Center (HEC), featured Accreditation Pass Rate Benchmarks. He shared that HEC's 2010 exam scores met or exceeded all benchmarks set by the accrediting agencies, which are based on nationwide pass rates that determine minimum scores to be achieved. He credited all the staff involved in making this happen. He noted that some benchmarks change each year (i.e., Nursing) due to adaptive tests.

Dr. Vittetoe featured the Student Veterans Association (SVA), an organization that falls under SPC's Veterans Program and is designed to help veterans returning to school. He

said this program has been enormously successful under the leadership of Mr. Jeff Cavanagh, Veterans Affairs Coordinator, and the Clearwater Campus would be much diminished without the presence of these veterans.

Dr. Karen Kaufman White, Provost of the St. Petersburg/Gibbs (SP/G) Campus, featured Teaching Modalities for the Campus' 4,104 mathematics students and the new "My She additionally highlighted specific math faculty for Bridge to Success" initiative. achievements above and beyond their classroom responsibilities, including the "Math Counts" team participation in the American Cancer Society Relay for Life. Dr. White reported a 33.9 percent growth in remedial math students over the prior year, and, in response to Mr. Johnston, cited, along with Dr. Law, several possible reasons for this growth. The president added that the pre-testing of high school students will effectively help reduce the number of remedial students. Mr. Gibbons asked that more emphasis be placed on space utilization for labs, as math is a critical subject for all students. Dr. Law highlighted some of the benefits of the "My Bridge to Success" program. With the focus on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math), as noted earlier, Mr. Burke said he hopes, as SPC is potentially challenged to enhance the engineering component of higher education, that we look at what the College needs to do to measure up to this expectation and to ensure the jobs are here locally to support the increase in this area of education. He asked Dr. Law to take this on as a Board challenge in order to give the trustees the knowledge base they need as policymakers. Mr. Burke further requested that the Board clerk provide a transcript of Dr. White's faculty commendations, along with a cover letter from the Board, to each of the faculty mentioned to show they were presented to the Board in a positive light and to communicate that the Board is proud of their actions and achievements. Further, Mr. Gibbons asked that all trustees be informed of any Palladium meetings similar to that which Mr. Brett attended this month.

Dr. Maureen Mahoney, Faculty Senate Chair, featured the latest update on the Florida Retirement System (FRS) and Faculty Evaluation Procedures, both topics the Board previously expressed interest in. She said faculty are clearly opposed to pension cuts, but were waiting on the Governor's recent budget announcement before addressing the issue. Mr. Burke said, while in Tallahassee, he did not hear anyone in the Legislature saying the Governor's pension reform bill would be their starting point. He said Senate leadership appears to be firmly behind Sen. Jeremy Ring's bill, which has a much more moderate tone. He recommended faculty leadership analyze what Sen. Ring's bill is offering, which is most likely the starting point for the pension reform, and added that the House has not yet come out with its own bill. Dr. Mahoney expressed appreciation for the Board's hard work and support on behalf of SPC at the state and federal levels. She shared various aspects of the College's Faculty Evaluation Procedures and expressed a confidence level with the process currently in place. Mr. Johnston expressed concern about student behavior, based on reports he receives first-hand, and the need for establishing standards for them to adhere to. Dr. Mahoney said standards of conduct are in place and made known to students, although it is difficult to police every student.

<u>11-033.</u> Under New Business, the president called upon Ms. Kay Burniston, Vice President of Baccalaureate Programs, Academic Effectiveness & University Partnerships; Dr. Jesse Coraggio, Director of Academic Effectiveness & Assessment; and Ms. Leigh Hopf, Director of Baccalaureate Program Support Services, who presented information under Item VII-A, Student Success and Achievement, in regard to calculating completion rates. Dr. Law noted that the numbers presented nationally are for first-time, full-time students, which is a small portion of SPC's population, and that today's report reflects an identified framework for the Board's information purposes.

Ms. Burniston gave an overview of the Completion Agenda Steps; Ms. Hopf spoke to the defined categories of students, those being New Students and Returning Students; and Dr. Coraggio highlighted assessment measures being implemented to help track completion rates. Mr. Burke sought clarification on how we are establishing up front what the student is seeking to achieve and whether or not that is being correctly measured. Mr. Johnston added that community college completion data is being unfairly judged, based on previous negative comments from a Gates Foundation representative, because our submitted data is being compared to that of the universities. Dr. Coraggio shared that the problem lies in the federal government's chosen measures, which are very biased toward the traditional student, and not in the data. He reviewed distinctions of the Federal FTIC (First Time in College) data (IPEDS) and said community colleges do not fare well when this data is used because it does not match the student population. In responding to how we define success, Dr. Coraggio said it is by assessing student goals and trying to tie credentialing into the various levels in order to achieve completion credit. Dr. Law added that the IPEDS reporting system is already set, and SPC can choose to propose an alternative by starting with what our College's expectations are for students, what we can do, and where we can focus our energies. He said our next effort is to go back four years and determine what the completion rates of various cohorts looked like and how that can be measured going forward. Mr. Burke sought clarification on when students start being measured, before or after remediation. Dr. Law explained that, as FTIC students, they are measured as soon as they are in college, thereby including the two-thirds who need remediation. In response to Mr. Burke's earlier question regarding determining a student's goals up front so they are accurately measured, Dr. Law responded that our abilities in that area are limited due to self-reported data. He noted one effort being moved forward by Academic & Student Affairs Vice President Tonjua Williams is a much more robust initial engagement with students to better understand their range of options. Dr. Williams said about 1,500 students who need two or more remedial courses will be attending fall term orientation this summer. Mr. Johnston recommended sending this material to Dr. Jill Biden, as a community college advocate, to seek her assistance in clarifying standards for community college completion rates. Dr. Law agreed we should be sharing this framework nationally. Mr. Brett asked if the president has had any conversations with fellow community college presidents on this topic or if there has been any consolidated effort to move this forward, to which he responded he has not but agrees it is a common concern, and institutions like ours need to be in the forefront of figuring out the best metric and data to use to make the case we want to make.

In conclusion, he said this framework is our best effort, and we will continue to work with the Board as to how it all plays out and what happens with each of the student groups.

Mr. Brett inquired as to a timeframe for rolling this out, to which Dr. Law estimated within 60 to 90 days. Dr. Coraggio said, as this Completion Agenda is being refined, he hopes to separate out the remedial students in an effort to bring up the overall rates, as requested previously by the Board.

On behalf of the Board, Chairman Burke thanked the team for their presentation on this very relevant topic. He further noted he is excited about Dr. Law's earlier mention that the College was looking into potential software to help monitor student success rates in a more timely and effective manner.

<u>11-034.</u> The Board considered Capital Outlay, Maintenance, Renovation, and Construction Item VII-E.1. Mr. Brett moved approval. Mr. Gibbons seconded the motion. Mr. Johnston inquired about the past practice of donating surplus computers to others for restoration. Dr. Law noted that some are currently being given to FAST (Faith and Action for Strength Together) in Pinellas County. Mr. Gibbons voted aye; Mr. Johnston voted aye; Mr. Burke voted aye; Mr. Brett voted aye; and Mrs. Bilirakis voted aye. Motion carried.

SUBJECT: Disposition of Surplus or Obsolete Property (Survey #536)

The items of tangible personal property that follow have been declared as surplus or obsolete and are of no further economical use to the College. The College's Technology Oversight Group (TOG) recommends that any desktop computer comparable to or older than the Dell GX270 model be retired and moved to surplus. Any laptop computer comparable to or older than the Dell D800 model, or any C series (or comparable), should be moved to surplus. These older computers do not efficiently support the Windows 7 operating systems and application suites.

SUBJECT: Review of Schematic Design Documents (Phase I) and Preliminary Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP), Project 186-B-11-4, Science Lab Upgrades, UPC Building, Seminole Campus

A.D. Morgan Corporation, the Construction Manager at Risk, in conjunction with Fleischman Garcia Architects, and College staff, have completed the Schematic Design Documents (Phase I) and Preliminary Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) Construction Documents for Project 186-B-11-4, Science Lab Upgrades, UPC Building, Seminole Campus. This design is based on the Educational Specifications that were developed by College staff and the User Advisory Committee.

This project will consist of science lab upgrades at the University Partnership Building rooms 307 and 309. This upgrade allows the labs to more effectively teach Biological Science Lab, Anatomy and Physiology I and II Labs, Field Biology of Florida with Lab, and Biology of Marine Life with Lab. Additionally, this project allows for the addition of Biology I Lab, Biology II Organism and Ecology Lab and an Oceanography Lab, which cannot be taught in the current space. The renovation will include casework with chemical resistant counters, lab tables, teaching bunkers and demonstration tables with chemical resistant tops and sinks. Additionally, the project will be upgrading the heating ventilating and air conditioning system to provide 100% outside air (including separation from the air flow in the rest of the building to avoid migration of odors) and provide an emergency exhaust system.

The total Preliminary GMP for this project is \$546,262 or \$230 per square foot with a Total Project Budget of \$654,671. The funding sources for this project are Public Education Capital Outlay (PECO) monies. Through the Direct Purchase Program, the contractor plans to purchase approximately \$180,000 of materials, which will provide approximately \$9,000 of tax savings for the project. The anticipated date for substantial completion is August 2011. This Preliminary GMP is subject to mandatory review for building codes, safety-to-life and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and further refinements through the value engineering process.

The following reflects the anticipated funding sources and values based upon the current total project budget. Please note that these funding sources and values may vary during the course of the construction of the project.

SUBJECT: Annual Membership Assessment in Florida College System Risk Management Consortium

Authorization is requested to pay the St. Petersburg College (SPC) 2011-2012 membership assessment in the Florida College System Risk Management Consortium (FCSRMC) for the policy period of March 1, 2011 through February 28, 2012 in the amount of \$1,540,726. This amount is \$215,522 or 12.3% less than the previous policy period. This year's assessment is based on the following changes: a decrease in the experience assessment for workers' compensation claims, an increase in full-time equivalent enrollment (FTE), a decrease in property values based on a decrease in the rate used for calculating FTEs, and changing from a large deductible workers' compensation plan to a self-insured plan, which resulted in lowering the collateral that the Consortium has to pay to the workers' compensation carrier.

Because the FCSRMC is on a March 1st to February 28th Fiscal Year, it is necessary to obtain approval from the Board in order to have authority to pay the first installment of \$513,575 by March 1, 2011 (for the March 1, 2011 through June 30, 2011 policy period). Additionally, we will pay the second installment of \$1,027,161 by July 1, 2011 (for the July 1, 2011 through February 28, 2012 policy period).

Shown below are the FCSRMC calculations to reach the assessment for the policy period of March 1, 2011-February 28, 2012:

The actual assessment approved by the FCSRMC Board for the previous policy period was \$1,756,248 based upon the College's FTE of 17,424, less a workers' compensation adjustment and an assessment refund for that prior policy period. That assessment was \$215,522 more than this year's assessment. This year's assessment is \$1,540,726.

The membership assessment covers administrative defense (reimburses defense cost regarding employment), general and automobile liability, property (all perils except theft), property (theft), workers' compensation claim experience, faithful performance money and securities, errors and omissions, fiscal agent bond, fine arts, and cyber risk. Pursuant to the decision made last plan year to cancel the Workers' Compensation Large Deductible Policy with \$500,000 deductible and go to a Self-Insured status under the State of Florida up to \$500,000 per claim, the College will also be assessed an additional \$10,352 for the plan year divided over four quarters.

The College will also renew 2011 insurance policies for the parking garage liability, parking lot liability, boiler and machinery liability, facilities use, student professional malpractice liability and student accident insurance (students enrolled in the allied health programs), storage tank liability, workers' compensation (statutory and employer's liability) for Puerto Rico, Intercollegiate Athletic Coverage and the Collegiate High school package. These individual policies renew separately on their respective anniversary dates.

The original design for the Ethics and Social Science Building showed the new building entirely encompassing the existing Teaching Auditorium Building at the Clearwater Campus. As the design of this building progressed and engineering soils tests were completed, the engineer recommended utilizing a more expensive foundation system due to the differential pressures between the two structures. This new foundation system would add several hundred thousand dollars to the construction price.

Therefore, we investigated demolishing the Teaching Auditorium Building and replacing the space in the new Ethics and Social Science Building (removing the need for the expensive foundation system). Replacing the Teaching Auditorium space in the new building will add cost to the project, but it will be less expensive than the foundation systems required if we construct around the Teaching Auditorium Building. Additionally, this allows us to provide a completely new facility without the constraints of the awkwardly shaped Teaching Auditorium and the irregularly sloped flooring system.

We are currently working on the revised plans and pricing to bring to the Board for approval, but the first step is receiving approval from the Board to terminate the existing building and to request approval from the State to terminate the building through the Castaldi Formula Analysis.

The architect for the Clearwater Campus Ethics and Social Science Project, Harvard Jolly Architecture, Inc., has completed a Building Valuation Analysis of the Teaching Auditorium Building (Facility 34) on the Clearwater Campus using the Castaldi Formula Analysis for Modernization of Educational Facilities, as requested by staff. This analysis is required by the Office of Educational Facilities, Florida Department of Education to allow the termination of any building constructed with PECO funds.

The Castaldi Formula Analysis stipulates two rules to consider when deciding whether to modernize or replace an educational facility: 1) If the cost of modernization exceeds 40% of a

cost to construct a comparable new building; and 2) If any two of the following items are required, modernization should be questioned; major replacement of plumbing, heating and air-conditioning (HVAC); total replacement of electrical wiring; basic structural changes involving space arrangements; complete replacement of roofing; and complete revamping of the fenestration pattern (exterior walls and windows).

Harvard Jolly Architecture, Inc.'s findings indicate that the ratio of modernization to replacement of the Teaching Auditorium Building (constructed in 1965) is 226%. This was calculated using the Castaldi Formula Analysis and confirms that the State would recommend replacement or construction of a new facility. The entire report by Harvard Jolly Architecture, Inc. is available upon request.

Per the State process for building replacement, this request will be submitted to the Florida Department of Education. Additionally, we will request the Office of Educational Facilities perform a site visit to inspect this building, review the request for demolition and approve the demolition of the Teaching Auditorium Building (Facility 43).

Approval is sought to execute the attached resolution to terminate the Teaching Auditorium Building (Facility 34) from the College Facilities Inventory.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT BETWEEN ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE AND PINELLAS COUNTY OSTEOPATHIC MEDICAL SOCIETY, INCORPORATED

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT is entered by and between the Board of Trustees of St. Petersburg College, a Florida public body corporate, whose mailing address is P.O. Box 13489, St. Petersburg, Florida 33733, (hereinafter, the "College") and Pinellas County Osteopathic Medical Society, Incorporated, a non-profit Florida corporation, whose mailing address is P.O. Box 2025, Largo, Florida 33779 (**"PCOMS"**).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the College and PCOMS did enter into that certain Lease Agreement dated January 20, 2010 whereby the College leased to PCOMS a portion of the premises located at the St. Petersburg College District Office, located at 6021 142nd Ave., Clearwater, Florida, 32760 ("District Office"); and

WHEREAS, unless otherwise specifically stated in this First Amendment to the contrary, the terms and definitions used herein shall have the same meaning as set forth in the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Lease Term is set to expire on January 31, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the College and PCOMS have agreed to certain changes in the terms of the aforesaid lease, and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and one dollar and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties further agree as follows:

1. The recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.

2. The Term of the Agreement shall be extended for a Lease Term of five (5) years ("Extended Term") beginning on February 1, 2011 and continuing through and until January 31, 2016.

3. BASE RENT. The Base rental payment for the Lease Term year beginning February 1, 2011 shall be:

Base rent will be due and payable in installments based upon the following schedule:

Additionally, PCOMS shall pay to the College its pro-rata share of any utility rate assessment, stormwater fee, or other surcharge that may assessed from time to time to the College for the District Office.

4. For the Lease Term years commencing 2012 and beyond, on each February 1st anniversary of the extension period, the monthly rental for the next twelve month period shall be adjusted by the change in the Consumer Price Index for the immediate twelve month period using the CPI formula as set out herein. The rent for each such extension year shall be the increase in the Consumer Price Index, but not less than 3% nor more than 6%.

5. The Consumer Price Index shall be defined as follows: At the end of each lease year (12 month period) of the extended term hereof, the monthly rental for the next succeeding lease year shall be increased by the annual increase in the Consumer Price Index ("CPI") where

"CPI" is the Consumer Price Index for the month of December just preceding such lease anniversary year, and the "Base CPI" is the Consumer Price Index for December of the previous lease year. As used herein, Consumer Price Index shall mean and refer to that table in the Consumer Price Index published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, now known as the "Consumer Price Index" for all Urban Consumers (Index 1982-84 = 100), U.S City Average, on an unadjusted basis. If such Index referred to above shall be discontinued, then any successor Consumer Price Index of the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, or successor agency thereto, shall be used, and if there is no successor Consumer Price Index, the parties hereto shall authorize the College to designate a substitute Index or formula. In no event shall the next lease year rental be less than the prior year.

6. Both College and PCOMS agree that if the December CPI has not been determined when February rent is due, PCOMS will pay the previous year rent until the December CPI has been determined, and then PCOMS shall pay over any difference to College upon demand and thereafter, pay the newly determined rent.

7. The Lease Agreement may be extended for additional one (1) consecutive year terms at the expiration of the Term upon mutual agreement of the parties in writing before the end of the Term. The College hereby reserves the right to increase the Base Rent for any mutually agreed upon term.

7. TERMINATION: PCOMS may terminate said lease by giving one year notice in writing to the following address:

SUBJECT: Final Approval of Site Acquisition, 2401 Drew Street, Clearwater, Florida (Faith United Church of Christ), Clearwater Campus

As discussed in its September 21, 2010 Board Meeting, the College has been given the opportunity to consider for purchase a site adjacent (west) of the Clearwater Campus. This property is the Faith United Church of Christ, with the address of 2401 Drew Street, Clearwater, Florida. This property consists of approximately 3.82 acres with approximately 17,472 square feet of improvements (sanctuary, office, day care facilities and a single-family structure).

The building is listed with the firm of Colliers Arnold with an asking price of \$1.65 Million. We have received two appraisals and negotiated a final purchase price of \$1.3 Million.

The College is in the process of completing the due diligence inspections of the site, including but not limited to appraisals, surveys, Phase I, Environmental Site Assessment, Asbestos Survey, Title and Development Order/DRI-related issues, and we anticipate closing on this property within 90 days.

Through the due diligence process, we discovered an underground fuel oil tank. The tank and some contaminated soil were removed. Minor groundwater contamination was identified. We are in the process of installing a monitor well to confirm groundwater impacts and determine the next course of action.

Approval is sought to purchase the property located at 2401 Drew Street, Clearwater, Florida to maximize the continued growth of the Clearwater Campus, including all necessary work.

Doug Duncan, Senior Vice President, Administrative/Business Services and Information Technology; Susan Reiter, Vice President, Facilities Planning and Institutional Services; and Phil Nicotera, Provost, Health Education Center, recommend approval.

6Hx23-4.61 REQUIREMENTS OF THE RESPIRATORY CARE PROGRAM

I. Progression Requirements:

Eligibility to start the first specialty course in the program is based upon the following minimum requirements.

- A. Requirements for Health Related Programs (6Hx23-4.53) apply to the Respiratory Care Program.
- B. Within six months of enrolling in the first specialty course each student must have a physical examination by a licensed physician or advanced RN practitioner verifying satisfactory

health status. This must include all immunizations, tests, and health verification as specified within contractual agreements with affiliating agencies. This may be required on an annual basis at the discretion of the program director of the healthrelated program to which the student has been admitted.

- C. Students transferring from another respiratory care program must be in good standing in such program (Exceptions will be handled by the Provost's Office at the Health Education Center).
- D. Completion of twelve (12) credits in general education or support courses with a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 to include BSC 2085 and BSC 2085L with a grade of "C" or better.
- E. Completion of a minimum of four (4) hours of observation, volunteer service, or work experience in a respiratory care department.
- F. Students who have been dismissed twice for academic failure of any combination of Respiratory Care Program courses, RET prefix, will be unable to return to the program.
- II. For the transitional program for respiratory technicians or students having prior experience or education in respiratory therapy, a two course series, RET 1264 and RET 1485, is specially designed as entry point into the respiratory care program. Students who successfully complete the special program enter the sophomore class, Session I.
 - A. Minimum requirements for application and admission are as follows:
 - 1. Completion of I. A., B., C. & D.
 - 2. Respiratory technicians certified by the National Board for Respiratory Care must submit a notarized copy of their certification.
- III. For the Paramedic/EMS transitional program, a three course series RET 1264, RET 1485, RET 2284, is specially designed as entry point into the respiratory care program. Students who successfully complete the special program enter the sophomore class, Session I.

- A. Minimum requirements for application and admission are as follows:
 - 1. Completion of I. A., B., C. & D.
 - 2. Submission of current Florida paramedic certificate.
- IV. Special Progress Requirements

In order to enroll in any course within the major with prerequisites, a grade of "C" or better must have been earned in all prerequisite Respiratory Care courses.

- V. In addition to SPC graduation requirements, students must meet these special graduation requirements:
 - A. A grade of "C" or better in each designated specialty course in this program.
 - B. Satisfactory completion of an end of program competency assessment examination.

11-042. Under the President's Report, Dr. Law distributed a revised preliminary rule on the College's facilities naming policy, which he stated was not subject for the Board's consideration at this meeting but would be processed for adoption subsequent to the Board's review and further input. He outlined the various revisions made mostly in response to Board request at its November meeting, including flexibility of the president in committee member appointments (para. II.B.4) and assurance of the Board's retention for final authority on naming recommendations (para. II-B.5), as well as some added exception language in regard to the Leepa-Rattner Museum of Art (para. II-B.6). Mr. Gibbons asked if this policy would include tributes like the Cecil B. Keene plaque placed at Midtown that should be contiguous to other campuses. Dr. Law said, with the Board's guidance, existing namings are being identified for enhancement and will be brought back to the Board. He showed an example of the Donald C. Sullivan EpiCenter signage, which has already been ordered. Mr. Burke expressed his personal thoughts that the College needs to consider appropriate recognition of all SPC past presidents as a living memorial to their legacy. In accordance with paragraph II.B.4, Mr. Gibbons asked that Dr. Law bring recommendations of names and appropriate tributes to the committee for consideration, and Mr. Burke further suggested consideration be given to the Board's committee representative specifically being the vice chair in order to set the tone as to responsibility. Dr. Law added he feels very strongly that the Board be in charge of this facility naming process.

In response to an earlier request of the Board to consider how the past contributions of former SPC president Carl Kuttler might be recognized, Dr. Law proposed an opportunity to replace what he feels is the College's most needy student support space, that being the approximately 70-year-old building on the SP/G Campus located on the corner of 66th Street and Fifth Avenue N. He shared a visual presentation of the aged existing building as well as an artist rendition of a proposed new facility based on his request of Ms. Reiter and the architects to consider replacing the current building with an iconic building of approximately 45,000 square feet that would house a comprehensive renewal of student support services. He showed that the Hendry Administration Building would remain intact, as would the Lynch Auditorium, with the new building to the east possibly being named for Dr. Kuttler since he is owed this honor. Mr. Burke recalled that staff previously provided, at the Board's request, a listing of all facilities already named and their history, and that list is being taken into consideration throughout this process so nothing is overlooked. Dr. Law said the proposed plan for SP/G allows for enhancements to the existing buildings, but would retain the heritage parts of the Campus. Mr. Gibbons recommended seeking out grant funds for historic preservation of the heritage part of the building and noted that the name on the building can always be kept although the building itself would be renewed.

In conclusion, Dr. Law stated he is ready to get started on this project with the Board's guidance since it could take several years. He noted the importance of the Campus taking ownership of this process as it moves forward.

6Hx23- NAMING OF COLLEGE FACILITIES

I. <u>INTENT AND PURPOSE</u>

- A. The primary intent of this naming policy is to allow St. Petersburg College to honor and recognize significant contribution(s) to the College by an individual(s), both in extraordinary service to the College and/or philanthropic giving.
- B. When considering naming recommendations, it shall be the priority of the Board to advance the most essential elements of the College's mission by matching naming honors to recognize extraordinary service and contributions to the College and to consider substantial gifts, endowments or irrevocable pledges of substantial giving. In the case of philanthropic giving, the gifts and endowments being bestowed upon the College shall benefit and support the facility being named.

II. <u>NAMING POLICIES</u>

- A. <u>Naming opportunities may be extended to both physical facilities of</u> <u>the College such as buildings, wings, rooms, auditoriums, etc., and</u> <u>intangible assets such as campus centers, institutes, departments,</u> <u>programs, etc., in both cases to be referred to within this Rule as</u> <u>College facilities.</u>
- B. <u>The following policies shall be established regarding naming</u> <u>opportunities and recommendations made to the President and the</u> <u>Board of Trustees:</u>
 - 1. <u>College facilities may be named for the purpose of either honoring</u> <u>individuals or groups for their extraordinary service to the College</u> <u>or in recognition of a significant gift, endowment, scholarship or</u> <u>program support donation to the St. Petersburg College</u> <u>Foundation. The amount of the gift or endowment shall be</u>

commensurate with the significance placed on the naming and its prominence in the facility.

- 2. <u>The Board may establish whether the naming of facility shall apply</u> for the expected life of the facility or otherwise. In the event that the facility is demolished and rebuilt or is substantially renovated the Board may, at its discretion, discontinue the original name, transfer the name to a new facility, or rename the building.
- 3. Notwithstanding any naming agreement that may be in effect, the Board reserves the right to revoke the naming of a facility at its own discretion where it deems that such name, in the judgment of the Board, may subject the College to public disrepute and as a result not continue to be in the best interest of the College to maintain.
- 4. The President shall appoint a standing committee of the College for the purpose of bringing forth naming recommendations as may be appropriate during any given period and as opportunities arise. The committee's composition shall be determined by the President and shall normally include representatives from the impacted campus or site, including, but not limited to, faculty, staff, and student representatives. The committee shall include at least one member of the Board of Trustees.
- 5. <u>The Committee shall submit its recommendations to the President</u> in writing for further consideration. The President shall submit his or her recommendation to the Board for its consideration and final <u>approval.</u>
- 6. <u>The Board shall approve the naming of any College facility as</u> <u>outlined herein, with the exception of the rooms, galleries,</u> <u>collections and exhibits of the Leepa Ratner Museum of Art.</u>
- 7. Upon approval of the Board the designated name shall be publicly disseminated and commemorated in signage in a manner consistent with the intent to honor those for which the facility or program is named.
