	Public Service Loan Forgiveness: The #1 way to currently get student loan forgiveness is to work in public service for 10 years. President Obama announced the PSLF – Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program, which will grant student loan forgiveness on qualifying loans after 120 payments (10 years). Qualifying employment is any employment with a federal, state, or local government agency, entity, or organization or a not-for-profit organization that has been designated as tax-exempt by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). 	 Karin Popkowski (for Jill Gould) – Department of Juvenile Justice Karin reported that the DJJ has been working with PERC to open the <i>ERP</i> (evening reporting centers) for youth. The MOU needs to be signed and then they will open. They serve the following zip codes: 33705, 33711 and 33712. This ERP pilot program is for youth would have had to go to the detention facility. The Judge has to approve the alternative diversion program. ERP is a maximum of 21 days and can serve 10 boys. The program is focused on deflecting people early on into the system to services in the community as opposed to systems of justice. This is part of the Criminal Justice Reform Movement The Juvenile Justice <i>Citizen's Academy</i> has 25 in the program and they are in their 3rd round. DJJ is having a person call to remind people of court dates and that has reduced the number of absences. Cheryl suggested that it would be a good place for internship students to man the phones and make the reminder calls.
